Monday evening the Bellefonte School Board took permanent steps toward the erection of a large, handsome school building on the site of the present stone structure on Allegheny street. D. F. Fortney, A. C. Mingle and W. H. Crissman have been appointed as a building committee who will give the matter attention. A special meeting of the board will be held Monday evening to consider what ought to be done.
