Pennsylvania State College's department of forestry is just completing arrangements to hold three endurance walking tests for its students. It plans a two days' endurance test of sixty miles a one-day endurance test and a speed test of twenty miles. These tests will be open to the forestry students only. and will be entirely optional.
