PINE GROVE MILLS.

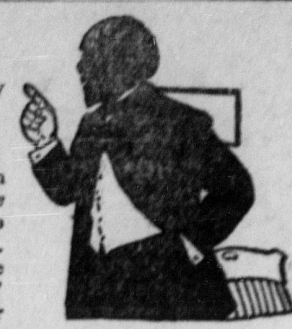
