


SIMON SNYDER-1808-1817.

Simon Snyder rose from a humble environment to the position of chief executive of the state by dint of hard work and determination. He was of German parentage. In 1776 he was apprenticed to a tanner. He devoted all his spare time to study. He was a member of the constitutional convention of 1789. In 1797 he was elected to the house of representatives and for six years served as speaker. His good record as a lawmaker, together with the fact that he had been a formidable candidate for governor against Thomas McKean, brought him favorably before the public as the Democratic candi- through the Borough of Bellefonte, in date for governor, and he was elected in 1808. 




