EDITORIAL.

The seventh proposed amendment to the state constitution permitting the appointment of election officers should be defeated. Mark it down for an adverse vote if you believe in the sovereignty of the people.

The Altoona Tribune, an able republican journal, thus speaks of one feature of the new tariff: "Just as we were confidently looking forward to a considerable reduction in the price of shoes, the result of free hides, the shoemen tell us that free hides are a mere bagatelle and that the increase in the value of other articles used in shoemaking will necessitate an actual increase in shoe prices."

President Taft said in his brief speech at Springfield, Mass., on Wednesday, that the people had voted him \$25,000 "for traveling expenses." That was inaccurate. The people obey the laws and the organic law of the land forbids such an appropriation. Congress voted that money and in accepting it the president violated the constitution and his oath of office.

Woman Licensed.

The classification of ministers was the most important matter considered at Friday morning's session of the United Brethren conference at Tyrone. The pastors at Jeanette and Baron avenue, Johnstown, were made missions and Upper Yoder was attached to the New Florence district, Rochester attached to Industry, and New Brighton to Beaver Falls.

For the first time in the history of the conference a woman was admitted and licensed to preach. Mrs. Nellie Showmen was the applicant.

Nine young men were also licensed to preach. They are E. G. Sawyer, C. W. Winey, G. W. Rothermel, John F. Strayer, B. F. Buggent, H. F. Reber, O. E. Krense, J. C. Erb and S. J. Wilson.

The Rev. J. L. Leichter, who has been a member of the Allegheny Conference for the past twenty-two years, resigned Thursday and in a few weeks will go to Fitzgerald, Ga., where he has accepted a call, a change in climate being necessary for his health.

Begged to be Kept in Jail.

"Please, Judge, don't let me out. I'm going on the water wagon again for seven years and want to get a good start by spending ten days in jail."

Thus pleaded Charles Purman, of Trenton, N. J., when Judge Harris, in Central Police Court, decided to dismiss him. The prisoner had become intoxicated for the first time in seven years, and the pace he went was so severe he landed in a cell. When he recovered he sent for the Rev. Charles H. Elder, pastor of the Trinity M. E. church, and asked for spiritual consolation, as well as a temperance pledge. The preacher interceded in the prisoner's behalf, and the Court would have dismissed him if Purman had not pleaded to go to jail. "I can muster strength enough to stay on the old cart if I go to jail," he said, and his request was granted.

To His Grave Indicted.

The body of Dallas C. Byers, the young Pittsburg millionaire who died at Dinard, France, August 26, arrived in Pittsburg on Friday and was buried in Allegheny cemetery Friday afternoon. This is the pathetic end to one of Pittsburg's Councilmanic graft prosecutions, for, when Mr. Byers died in a strange country, he was under indictment here in connection with the councilmanic bribery cases. He went to France when the indictment was found.

The prosecutions arose over an ordinance to have a street in the neighborhood of the Byers Pipe Mills vacated, and evidence was introduced showing that the "Big Six" clique in Councils had received \$25,000.

Wants Quay Statue in Jail.

A plan for making the Quay statue a real utility was broached Friday in the court of Alderman J. Williams Bayles, at Harrisburg.

James Sylvester, a one-legged man had just been sentenced to ninety days in jail for insulting women. "Aw, say, judge," he protested, "that ain't fair. That means getting out just before Christmas with no money. Make it ninety more, and then I'll get out in the spring when I can get work."

"And say, judge," he pleaded in conclusion, "send up the Quay statue to keep me from getting lonely!"

How to Vote.

To vote a straight party ticket and at the same time vote for or against the proposed constitutional amendments at the coming November election, it will be necessary for the voter to mark his ballot twelve times. One mark will be required in the square opposite the party name for a straight vote for all the candidates of that party, and, as there are ten amendments and a schedule, eleven more marks will be necessary. The voter who undertakes to split his ticket will, of course, have as many additional marks as there are state and county offices to be filled.

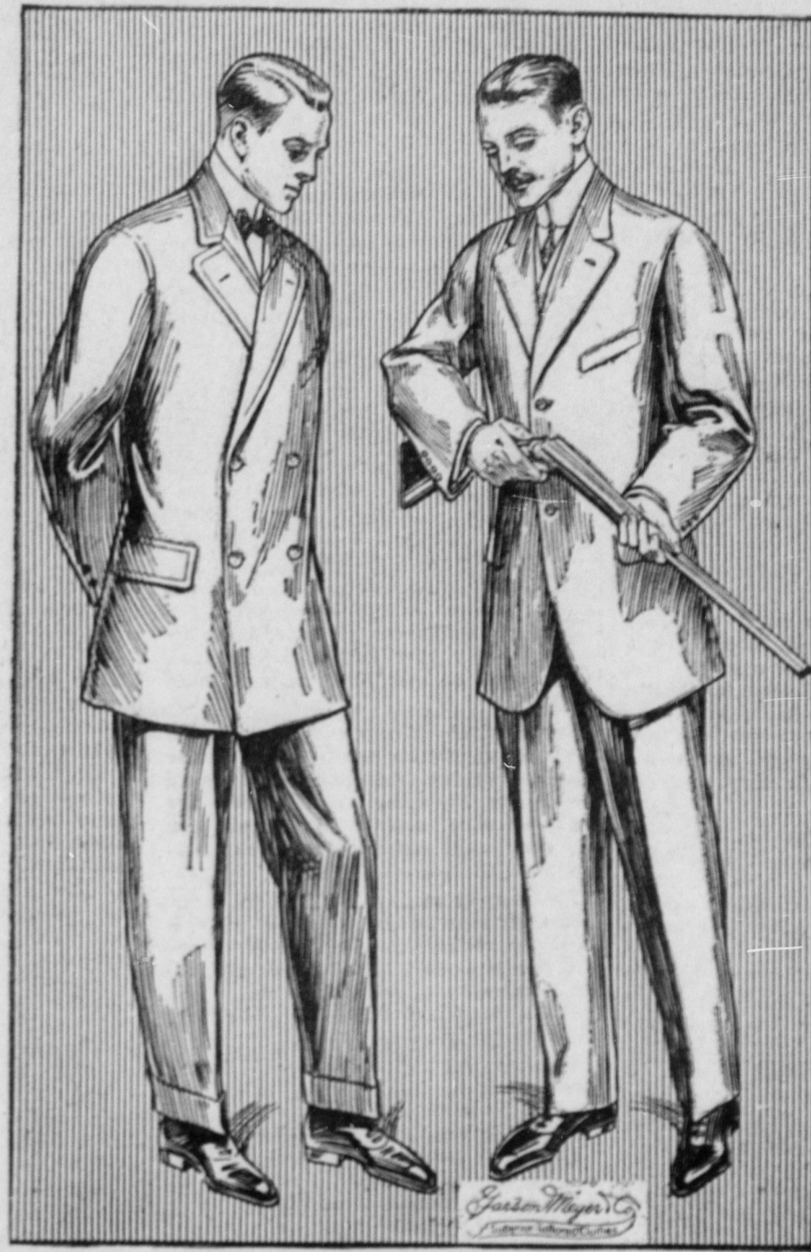
