LYNCH A NEGRO

AN UNUSUAL EXCITEMENT AT CAIRO, ILLINOIS

BODY RIDDLED BY BULLETS

Then Burned the Body While the Mob Rejoiced—Implicated in Killing a Girl—Dragged through the Streets—Sheriff Held Prisoner.

Will James, the negro suspected of the murder of Miss Annie Pelley last Monday night, was lynched in Cairo, Ill., on Friday night, while 10,000 persons looked on.

James was hanged from the public arch at Eighth and Commercial streets the most prominent square in the city. Women were the first to pull on the rope, but it broke as the negro was drawn into the air. Then the horrible fury of the mob broke in its full strength, volley after volley being fired into the prostrate form. At least 500 bullets were fired into the body. The negro was fairly shot to pieces. Then the mangled body was dragged over the streets for more than a mile to the spot where the murder was committed. There, at Sixth and Elm streets, the body was hurled upon a pile of wood in an alley and the torch was applied. What was left of the negro was quickly burned, while the dense crowd rejoiced.

James made a partial confession, implicating another negro, Arthur Alexander. Search for this man began at once, with the mob determined that he, too, should pay the penalty meted out to James.

Hundreds of Women in Mob. They marched the negro direct to the public arch, sweeping the street like a flock of sheep might tread a narrow lane. Hundreds of women were in the crowd, anxious to help do the bloody work. Sheriff Davis, having been defeated in his attempt to hide the negro, pleaded for the life of the prisoner, but received scant attention. When Cairo was reached, the sheriff was taken in charge by a part of the mob, while the rest rushed the negro rapidly to his funeral pyre. The mob that chased the sheriff and the negro was so large that it scoured the entire country from Karnak to Vienna, Ill., a distance of 16 miles.

STATE COLLEGE DAIRY.

The regular Winter courses at the Pennsylvania State College, begin November 30th, 1909 and close February 25th, 1910. Three courses are offered in dairying, namely: dairy husbandry, buttermaking and cheesemaking. The general dairy husbandry course is designed to fit men to manage dairy farms. Students are given training in the feeding and handling of dairy cows, the management of the dairy, the keeping of records and the making and handling of dairy products on the farm.

The course of butter and cheesemaking are for men who intend to work in butter or cheese factories. The students receive instruction in the principles of buttermaking. This course is especially valuable for buttermakers who wish to make a special study of starters, cream ripening, moisture, control or any other special phase of buttermaking. The cheese work is given in a well equipped laboratory.

Students taking either the butter or cheesemaking course will also receive instruction and practice in ice cream and cottage cheese making.

The total expense for the twelve weeks need not exceed \$85.00. Further information or a catalog of the short courses will be sent upon applying to the dairy husbandry department, the Pennsylvania State College, State College, Pa.



GOVERNORS OF PENNSYLVANIA.

Portraits of Each Accompanied by Brief Biographical Sketch—Will be Published in Order, One Each Week.



GEORGE WOLF—1829-1835.

This commonwealth is indebted to George Wolf for the establishment of the common school system throughout the state and the inauguration of state aid to educational institutions. He was of German parentage and made his first appearance in public life as a clerk in the prothonotary's office in Northampton county. He was elected to the legislature in 1814 and was elected to the senate the following year. From 1824 to 1828 he was a member of congress. It was during this period that the feeling against secret societies began to crystallize and the Anti-Masonic party was formed. Mr. Wolf was nominated for governor by the Republicans and was elected. He was elected for a second term; but, a split having occurred in the party, he was defeated for a third term by Joseph Ritner. After completing his gubernatorial services he was appointed comptroller of the treasury by President Jackson and afterward collector of the port of Philadelphia.
