JOSEPH RITNER-1835-1839.

Born in 1780 in Berks county, Joseph Ritner began life under many handicaps, but he succeeded in obtaining an education which fitted him for the serious duties of life. He represented Washington county in the legislature from 1820 to 1826 and served for a time as speaker. He was twice the candidate of the Anti-Masonic party for governor, but was defeated each time by George Wolf. He was elected in 1835 and served one term. He put into practical operation Governor Wolf's common school policy and was in full sympathy with it. There were lively times in Pennsylvania politics in those days. When in 1839 Governor Ritner was defeated for re-election by about 5,000 votes charges of fraud were made and an invertigation by the legislature was demanded. The Democrats won, and Governor Ritner retired to private life. He died in 1869 at the age of ninety years.
