Bradford Will Be Headquarters. The Bradford Era says: "Hon. S. R. Hamilton, of Clearfield, Pa., supervisor of the census for the district, will make his headquarters here. He expects to have his enumerators for the four counties—Cameron, Clearfield, McKean and Centre, appointed, examined and their appointments approved by January 1, 1910.

Permits to Hunt. Forestry Commissioner Conklin said on Friday that he had given permits to 3,000 persons to hunt on state reservations for the present deer season which began last week. This is the largest number since the state reserves were established.

Measure the Roads. The roads are all to be measured within six months after the passage of the act and that means that all roads must be measured before Nov. 15, 1909. While this act does not in express terms so provide, yet it would seem to bear the construction that unless such measuring is done and reported to the State Highway Commissioner within three months the township will not be entitled to the 50 per cent. from the State.
