

#### New Trolley Line.

The trolley line from Huntingdon to Cold Springs will be completed and running by June 15 and cars will run to Big Valley by the end of Septem-ber. Work on the Huntingdon, Lewistown and Juniata Traction company line will start in a few days with 400 to 600 men employed. The terminus at Huntingdon will be on the south side of the river on the grounds of R. W. Jacobs, president of the company, and a big receiving depot for a freight and a passenger station will be built there. Work will begin on the Cold Spring extension this week or next. contract for the grading on the lines has been let to the Pennsylvania Construction company of Allentown.

#### State Forest Reserves.

Bedford county has 9,935 acres of state forest reserves; Centre county, 75,790; Clearfield county, 47,910; Fulanty, 6,189; Huntingdon county, 54,184; Juniata county, 3,199; Mifflin county, 51,281; Perry county, 19,083; Somerset county, 3,467; Clinton coun-ty, 117,819. Not all the land set aside as forest reserves is covered with trees; some of it has been burned over and spots left bare. However, the state plants these spots up again, as the land is well adapted to the pur-pose. At the beginning of the year, pose. At the beginning of the year, the state owned 916,539 acres of forest lands in twenty-six counties. Blair has no such lands.


