"Physical degeneracy and chronic diseases are increasing," continued Dr. Kellogs. "Heart disease has increased 135 per cent. in 30 years. Kidney disease has increased in Massachusetts alone 167 per cent. Cancer is in-creasing. One-eighth of the adult women who die today die from cancer. Insanity has increased 100 per cent. in 50 years. Fifty years ago there were 9,000 insane persons to every million. Today there are 18,000. There are 34,000 idiots and lunatics to every million persons. It is due largely to the increased physical degeneracy or aginating from our manner of living. "Women particularly are showing the results of this degeneracy in the decreased birth rate and the thriving of the concerns manufacturing infants
