

IRVIN DELANEY RETIRED.

For the last ten years the P. R. R. watchman at the railroad crossing at Gamble, Green & Co's flouring mill, Bellefonte, was Irvin Delaney, of Milesburg. On the 2nd of June he rounded out his 70 years of age. When quite young he became an employe of the Pennsylvania Railroad company, and has continually been in the company's service until he reached 70 years of age, meaning that by his own and regulations of the corporation he had to step down and leave somebody younger to take his place. On the 1st of July he was relieved of his position and his name placed on the pension list. He first went to work as a trackman on the Bald Eagle valley road. After serving there a number of years he was transferred to Warriors-mark, where he spent eleven years, within a month. He then went to Tyrone and then to Mill Hall where he worked in the pumping station. From Mill Hall he came to Bellefonte as watchman at one of the most hazardous crossings between Tyrone and Lock Haven. Mr. Delaney did his work well and faithfully. He pulled many a person off the track who otherwise might have been ground to pieces under the merciless wheels, and many an auto party he saved from being struck.

While Mr. Delaney was a veteran employe of the railroad company, he is also a veteran of the Civil war, going to the front with Capt. Gregg, of the 5th Pennsylvania Reserves. It was the first company that left Centre county whose members enlisted for three years. He was a good soldier and was honorably discharged, and is on Uncle Sam's pension list at \$12 a month. He has applied through W. H. Musser, pension agent, for an additional pension of \$3 a month which is given old soldiers when they arrive at 70 years of age. As stated he is in good health, and being an old bachelor, he can now enjoy the balance of his life. We trust he may live to round out a century.

To accomplish this he cut the sermons down to about one-half the usual length and instead of delivering tiresome dogmatic discourses substituted interesting and edifying addresses of a popular character.

The effect was instantaneous. The attendance, which had been gradually dwindling, increased and now the Bellport Presbyterian church has its full share of the church-going population. Hooks Prize Chickens. John B. Clemmens, a Pennsylvania Railroad signalman, of Newton Hamilton, who is a chicken fancier, had a flock of half-grown games in which he took great pride, and was looking forward to lucrative sales later in the season. His two sons were fishing an outline in the river Thursday night, and on returning home the next morning threw the lines containing large seal hooks, baited with chunks of veal, on the river bank at the boat landing.

A couple hours later there was a commotion among the flock of games, which had meandered down to the landing, that resembled a general family row. An investigation proved that the chickens had found the veal and swallowed it, hooks and all. As the hooks were tied together at one end, it was impossible for the flock to get their heads apart. Six of the choicest died during the removal of the hooks, and it is rumored that the air along the Juniata, as well as the far famed river, was blue for a time.

To Enforce Law. From Harrisburg comes the statement that the state authorities are this summer going to enforce the provisions of the pure food law which makes it unlawful for any person to expose food for sale in such manner as to render it liable to become contaminated, and that means that food must not be exposed to flies. Food produce offered for sale must be covered to protect from flies. Agents of the state are authorized to make arrests on sight where food is kept in an unsanitary condition. It behooves grocers and dealers generally, therefore, to make their preparations now to protect their goods from flies if they don't want to be prosecuted.

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NO PAY FOR FIRE FIGHTING.

Should Pennsylvania be visited with forest fires during the next eight months, the State will have to depend upon their being extinguished by men who will volunteer their services for fighting such fires with no hope of reimbursement, unless the next legislature will see fit to pass a deficiency appropriation bill to defray such expenses. State Commissioner of Forestry Robert S. Conklin said that the appropriation of \$40,000 for such work has been entirely exhausted. No further funds will be at hand until the next general assembly shall provide them. The Forestry Department officials feel that the situation is more or less acute, but they say that the only thing to be done is to make the men of the mountain counties acquainted with the facts and trust to their patriotism to impel them to turn out and fight any forest fires which may come along.

Northumberland to Grow.

It is reported at Northumberland that officials of the Pennsylvania railroad predict that 3,000 men will be employed in the operation of the new yards there and that when every part is in operation five years hence three times that number will be employed in the yards or kindred work. From this it is figured that Northumberland will have a population of 40,000 persons. In this event the borough fathers who many years ago gave the town wide limits will be credited with a far sighted policy. It is here where Thomas A.
