In the case of storms, or other natural disturbances which interrupt the ordinary telephone and telegraph service, the railroad companies are largely helpless on account of their inability to communicate from station to station or signal towers. The simple, efficient, and easily operative wireless system would avoid this difficulty, and save much time and expense to both travelers and the railroad companies.

The Experiment Station now has a fine wireless outfit for carrying out this work. By means of other wireless sets erected at various railroad stations, the opportunity for carrying out a practical line of research is excel-
