A Recent Act of Assembly Makes Important Change. Mr. Kurtz:—The article in the Dem porat of this week in answer to the question of Mr. S. H. Shaffer, about When the terms of Township Oficers terms expire" was so long delayed after it was written that by reason of an Act of Assembly ap-proved after the article was written, but before it was published, the sit-

uation is changed. By an Act of Assembly approved March 2nd, 1911, it is provided "That all public officers, holding office at the date of the approval of said Amendments, (referring to the Constitutional Amendments of 1909) not otherwise provided for, whose terms of office ex. pire at any time during an odd num-bered year, shall continue to hold their offices until the first Monday of January in the next even numbered year, and that all such officers whose Alfred Osman, of Altoona, was terms expire in an even-numbered greeting old friends here a few days year, shall continue to hold their offices until the first Monday of Janin the next even-numbered

To illustrate: The term of tax col-lectors elected in February, 1909. would expire under the old law April first, 1912; but under the Constitu-tional Amendments and the Act above quoted, their terms will not expire until the first Monday of January, 1914. Their successors being elected at the November election, 1913. Overseers of the Poor elected in 1909, and any other officers whose term is only two years, will continue in office to the first Monday in January, 1912. Their successors being elected at the No-vember election of this year.

It is now difficult to say anything certain about School Boards, but as matters now stand it is held by the Attorney General's Department that under the Act above set out the terms of School Directors are also extended un-til the first Monday of January, 1912, so that School boards will not organize until that time. The directors elected in November, 1911, will be sworn in at that time. This may be changed by the new school code now
