TWO MINE DISASTERS WITHIN 24 HOURS

MANY PERISH WHILE UNDER-GROUND.

LOSS OF LIFE IS APPALLING

Scranton, Pa., and Littleton, Ala., Were the Scenes of the Awful Toll of Death-The Latter a Convict

Throop, a village just to the north of Scranton was the scene of a mine disaster April 7, which numbered probably sixty victims, fifty men and ten boys, including Water Knight, the Isaac Dawe, a fire boss, and Joseph Evans, who was in charge of the United States mine rescue car, that was rushed to the scene, and who was suffocated because the oxygen-charged armor he wore failed to work.

The origin of the fire is unknown. It started in an engine house, at the opening of a slope leading to a tunnel from which opened about thirty new chambers. There was no other opening to the tunnel, and the fire completely blocked the egress of the more than half a hundred men in these new workings. One man started to alarm them, but the smoke became so thick that he turned back. They were a thousand feet beyond the fire, and 750 feet below the surface.

Mine rescuers from the government station in Wilkes-Barre, rushed to the scene with their car, and assisted in fighting the flames and then three of them with helmets on their heads and oxygen tanks on their backs went into the slopes. They found three

Joseph Evans, head of the government rescuers, was one of these three. He was seen to tug at his helmet and tear it from his head. It had evidently failed to work. He was carried out, but had inhaled so much smoke and gas from the burning coal that he died in four hours.

There were four hundred men in the mine when the fire started, about sixty of them in the workings into which the slope led. These sixty were at work in a "blind" tunnel, at the end of the slope.

Convicts Perish in Mine.

More than a hundred State and county convicts were killed by a mysterious explosion in the Banner coal mines, near Littleton, Alabama, Sat-urday morning. One hundred and ninety miners were sent into the underground workings. Twenty men have come out of the mines alive and the remainder underground are dead. It is not known whether the explosion was caused by gas or dust. The explosion occurred far under ground. Most of the miners are colored men. The greatest damage has been done to a shaft known as No. 2. The fan in this shaft was destroyed, making the rescue work more difficult.

The disaster is now thought to have been caused by an explosion of pow-der, which set fire to dust. As the fan was destroyed, black damp quickly spread over the mine. Runners were sent out to warn the workmen, and this is responsible for so many being taken out alive.


