

REAL REVOLUTION AMONG DAUGHTERS THE ANNUAL CONVENTION AN AMUSING AFFAIR. FOUGHT OVER THE ELECTION

It Was the Real Thing—Called Each Other Nasty Names—Had a Lively Time—At It All Night—Worse Than Tom Cats—A Gay Time.

Thirty red-eyed, weary women, worn by a day and a night of labor and strife, looked in a big room in Memorial Continental hall, struggled with the final count in the election of the Daughters of the Revolution early on Friday of last week.

Plenty of Fighting Spirit. Bravely in our early history, they were shown more fighting spirit than the thirty matrons who in bedraggled finery at dawn sat in the paper-strewn room, beside the sacred ballot boxes.

When it became apparent that the count would be delayed, a hastily-prepared breakfast was pushed through a partly opened door to the weary thirty and they went again to work. Meantime 100 or 150 women, who had kept an all-night vigil waiting for the vote, crowded the halls of the big Memorial building, anxiously discussing the prospect.

And All for Naught. When the excitement was at its height, as the anxious delegate awaited the report of the tellers, the surprising announcement was made that as the result of a clerical error, the entire work of counting the votes would have to be done over again, the all-night work of the tellers having gone for naught.

Daughters Had Lively Time. There was trouble a-plenty in the convention hall on Thursday of last week. The climax was reached when Mrs. Lewis K. Torbet, of Illinois, placed in nomination Mrs. William Cumming Story, of New York, who opposed Mrs. Scott.

When Mrs. Ames finally got recognition, she came to the stage trembling with indignation, declaring that the entire state delegation had come to the congress instructed to vote for Mrs. Scott, and concluded, "Mrs. Lewis is Torbet. In coming to this platform and nominating Mrs. Story, had branded herself forever as a traitor."

WASHINGTON NOTES. The Trusts no Longer Control Congressmen.

On the day the present Congress was called to order the writer happened to be seated beside H. B. Martin, secretary of the American Anti-Trust League. Just after Speaker Champ Clark had concluded his now-famous opening address, Mr. Martin turned toward me and said: "There is a deeper meaning to this occasion than most of the spectators are aware. I am not speaking from a partisan viewpoint. What I allude to is that this is the first time in forty years—the first time since the trust problem has been acute in this country, that there is a real, out-and-out anti-trust majority in the House of Representatives."

House Its Own Master. The fact that a majority of the members of the new House stand for the passage of the reciprocity measure and the farmers free list bill is evidence that the House is no longer controlled by the tariff trusts. Lumber, for instance, would not go on the free list if Big Business was still in control. Heretofore the lumber interests—the same interests and individuals that are alleged to have elected and retained Lorimer in the Senate—have been able to prevent lumber from going on the free list.


Trusts Not in Saddle No. Until this session of Congress the lumber trusts, steel trust, implement trust and beef trust have had easy sailing. They have had but to congregate generally to republican campaign funds, receiving in return at the hands of the republicans sufficient protection to give them monopolies on American markets and to enable them to collect from consumers in excessive prices not only the amount of their campaign contributions, but handsome profits in addition thereto.

No Local Option for Illinois. The county local option bill was killed in the Illinois legislature, after a stiff fight. The people, after a long and stubborn fight with special privilege, have restored popular government in the House of Representatives, the lower branch of Congress. The fight must not stop until the people are equally well represented in the United States senate and in the executive mansion.

VIVID DESCRIPTION FAMINE IN CHINA A BELLEFONTE BOY SEES STARVATION AND DEATH. A LETTER FROM S. H. MCCLURE

Now a Missionary in the Heathen Country—Two Million Without Food—No Food in Sight For Months—Harrowing Scenes. When Samuel B. McClure, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jas. L. McClure, of this place, left home and friends on his faro trip, he little thought of the terrible scenes of suffering and privation which he would witness. A recent letter to his parents, which is published in part, tells the story to us who are sitting in popular places a million or more, crying for the crumbs from our tables. Mr. McClure is a missionary of the China Inland Mission, and is located at Anking, China, in the very midst of the starving populace, and his letter is an interesting synthetic recital of the true conditions in that country:

Anking, China, March 14, 1911. The number in absolute need at first was put at one million, but I doubt now if two million would cover the number who do not know from whence the next meal is coming. The women come to my guest room in great crowds and often prostrate themselves on the floor pleading for help with only a few exceptions, that I think I can trust not to spread the news of help given here. I have to turn a deaf ear to all their pleadings for it is not safe to give publicly to these poor from ones own door lest the crowd increase and get riotous.
