Some time ago I thought I was telling a pitiful story when I told of people living on wheat bran. But as the days go by and as I know more of the needs, the story becomes far more pitiful. Some women are to be seen cooking nothing but the leaves of trees such as we would use for puttng into a horse stable, for his bed. But the worst that I have heard of has been the cooking of simple dry wheat chaff. Now how that can, be considered as human food I do not know and do not attempt to explain to you but that is what is done. It only means that these poor sufferers are at their very last extreme. It is beyond me to give you any description of what is all around us. Human beings barefooted and all but naked on the streets most pitifully crying out "I am hungry!" I am hungry!" She was one of the multitude who got nothing and when she returned to her home at night it was to learn that her mother had hanged herself to get rid of the gnawing hunger.


