

FOUND SOLOMON'S SWORD AND CROWN WHILE MAKING EXCAVATIONS NEAR JERUSALEM.

RELICS OF TRIBES OF ISRAEL

Were Searching for the "Ark of the Covenant"—Under the Mosque of Omar—Fled With Their Sacred Treasures—Caused an Uprising.

The inhabitants of Jerusalem, have been aroused to the point of rioting by the operations of a party of English archaeologists who are accused of having excavated beneath the inviolable Mosque of Omar and removed relics reputed to be the Ark of the Covenant, the Coner and other sacred relics which belonged to the tribes of Israel.

Azmy Boy, the Turkish governor, was mobbed on the streets for supposed complicity in the profanation and hooted as "a pig." The expedition worked for two years on a large scale, beginning at the village of Siloam, which lies at the southeast end of Jerusalem, on the southern slope of the Mount of Olives, overlooking the Valley of Kedron and the Pool of Siloam.

The explorers are credited with having excavated a passage from the Pool of Siloam toward the place where once stood Solomon's Temple, built in 1011 B. C., pillaged and restored and finally destroyed by Titus A. D. 70.

Failing to reach the relics sought in this manner, the explorers, according to the alleged consensus of the guards of the mosque, bribed the guards, entered the mosque and after digging on six nights spirited away the treasures "the whereabouts of which," says an Arabic paper, "none know except God and these English."

Ring and Crown Were Lost. Meantime the whereabouts of the archaeologists and the nature of their spoils is a mystery. The expedition with the prizes embarked at Jaffa, fifty-four miles northwest of Jerusalem, on April 19, boarding Captain Parker's yacht, which had been awaiting them, and setting sail before the people of Jerusalem learned what they had done. It is probable the yacht is now headed for England.

There is no doubt that the excavators hoped to discover the Ark of the Covenant and the Seven-Branded Candelstick, but a dispatch says it is believed the explorers found Solomon's crown, his sword and his ring, and an ancient manuscript of the Bible.

The extent of the operations is shown by the statement that \$300,000 has been spent by the syndicate, who engaged engineering experts who had been employed on the building of the London subway.

Gelatinized Gasoline. Aeroplaning will enter into its great era, according to experts, when patients have been granted for gelatinized gasoline, to be used as condensed fuel for the machines. This invention, it is understood, is before patent attorneys, and it is said it will be controlled by the Standard Oil company.

This gelatinized gasoline is pure gasoline, one gallon of which, in its new form, will be about the size of a stick of shaving soap. It can be used also by automobiles and all engines which depend on gasoline as a motive force.

It is said by patent attorneys that the new compound, if found to work satisfactorily under the given conditions of engine proper, will make gasoline one-half cheaper, because it lessens the cost of storage and transportation.

Orchard Heated by Stoves. At Lakota, in the large fruit orchard of James M. Zion, a mile east of Clarksville, Ind., a test was made of oil and coal burning devices as a means of saving fruit from the frost. Mr. Zion, assisted by six men from the Purdue University experiment station, started fires in 200 heaters and raised the temperature in the orchard from 4 to 6 degrees above that outside the orchard.

Mr. Zion and his assistants said the experiment undoubtedly proved it would be possible to save fruit from frost by use of these heaters.

Wrecks Widows 4 Sisters. Four sisters, all widows of railroad engineers killed in wrecks, met at the funeral of Engineer Thomas Pilcher, of Huntington, W. Va., killed in a wreck on the Chesapeake & Ohio railroad near Thurmond last Tuesday.

Mr. Pilcher was one of four engineers who married four sisters, the Misses Garner, of Albemarle county, Virginia.

Each victim met death in his cab; each was the engineer of an express train, and the fireman of each was killed with them, although no passengers were hurt.

This will keep him confined for more than a year. The case of Buffalo Bill Reager, who pleaded guilty of the same offense at the January term, which had been postponed, was then taken up. Reager was sent to jail on a similar sentence.

BRYAN CHIEF SPEAKER. At 300th Anniversary of King James, Translation of Bible.

Telegrams from President Taft and Ambassador Bryce were read Thursday of last week at the celebration of the three hundredth anniversary of the English translation of the Authorized Version of the Bible. The chief address was delivered by William J. Bryan, who challenged materialists and those opposed to the theory of divine inspiration of the Bible to show they were right by producing a superior book to that volume.

"Atheists and materialists declare that the Bible is merely the work of man," said Mr. Bryan, "and that it was written under the limitations that apply to human wisdom. Taking this position they necessarily must contend that, unless man has degenerated in ability and declined in wisdom, he now can produce a book equal to the Bible. Let them produce it."

"Atheists and materialists have assailed the Bible at every point; they have been as bold as the prophets of old in defying the living God and in heaping contempt upon the written word. Why not challenge them to put their doctrines to the test? When Elijah was confronted by a group of scorners who mocked the Lord, he invited them to match the power of their God against the power of his, and he was willing to concede superiority to the one who would answer with fire."

"Now, why not a Bible test? Let them collect the best of their school to be found among the graduates of universities, as many as they please and from every land. Let the members of this selected group travel where they will, consult such libraries as they please; let them glean in the fields of geology, botany, astronomy, biology, and zoology and then roam at will wherever science has opened a way; let them use every instrumentality that is employed in modern civilization and when they have exhausted every source, let them embody the results of their best intelligence in a book and offer it to the world as a substitute for the Bible in hand."

"They have prayed to their God to answer with fire, prayed to annihilate with an earnestness that is pathetic; but they have employed in the worship of blind force a faith greater than faith requires, but their almighty is asleep."

"But to the doubts and 'I don't know's' of the agnostic, the Christian, Bible in hand answers, 'I believe.'"

At the expiration of his sentence, Peters will be arraigned on the charge of assault and battery, non-support and threats preferred by his wife.

Flies Avoid Blue Paint. Dr. J. Crumline, secretary of the Kansas State Board of Health, has invented two methods by which the house fly can be kept out of kitchens and barns. One is to paint the barn or kitchen blue, any shade, and the other is to grow hops around the doors. The blue paint idea came from France, where two scientists in the course of experiments with flies found that cow stables which were painted blue inside were immune. It was also observed that kitchens and dining rooms which were papered in blue or painted blue also were avoided by flies.

Death of A. L. Koons. Aaron L. Koons, a former prominent resident and candy manufacturer of Tyrone, died at his home in Ellipticaltown, Pa., Wednesday evening, May 3rd. SCOOTAC REGION WAS SPANISH PROPERTY

VALUABLE MINERAL AND COAL DEVELOPED.

NOW IS BECOMING VALUABLE

Section Adjoins Centre County—Once Was a Very Busy Place—Mines and Railway Abandoned—Three Town Sites.

In an elaborately illustrated article Pennsylvania Geologist of Williamsport, in its issue of April 30, published the following article which will be of interest to many of our readers:

Prospectors on the lands of the Scootac Mining company are discovering a far greater wealth of coal and clay than was ever believed to exist in the West Branch valley of the Susquehanna river. Scores of holes have been drilled on the top of the mountains west of Lock Haven, in the Scootac region, and nearly every hole shows better coal than was found in earlier tests.

The holdings of the Scootac company are rich in coal, clay, and romance. Fifty years ago, in a time of revolutionary outbreaks in Spain, the queen of that kingdom sent great quantities of money to America to be invested in timber and mining lands. Much of it was spent in this same Scootac district. To this day the sites of three towns known as Reveltown, named after the superintendent of the operations, and Peacock and Rock Cabin, are to be seen in the mountainous region. Only the foundations of the houses remain but the orchards are still growing, and miners find no trouble in supplying themselves with apples in the fall of the year. The mines at Rock Cabin can still be entered, and reveal a primitive method of taking coal from the earth. Instead of pumping water from the mines as is done today, the miners of 50 years ago kept out of the water, and any coal below the water was safe from the pick. Hence the Spanish capital was used in working outcroppings, and the best coal was left for the present and future generations.

The whole operation was abandoned years ago, after the coal pile at New York harbor belonging to the foreign company was destroyed by fire, and an engine at the mines was blown up. It appears that Supt. Revel and his men left in haste and abandoned everything excepting their five locomotives. The roads they used in the mines are still there. Trucks, turntables and other evidences of mining in early days, also are still in evidence. The roads the settlers used are to be seen in the forests, but the fox terrier, was the only living creature in the room. Prominent ministers, most of them also trustees of the institution, were shocked when the news was conveyed to them. Gordon MacRury, of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, according to the report made to the directors, was expelled on March 1, 1911, for profanity.

J. S. MacRury, his brother, O. S. MacFarland, of Beria, O., and H. H. Bird, of Somerset, Pa., were dismissed on April 12, 1911, for conduct unbecoming candidates for the ministry.

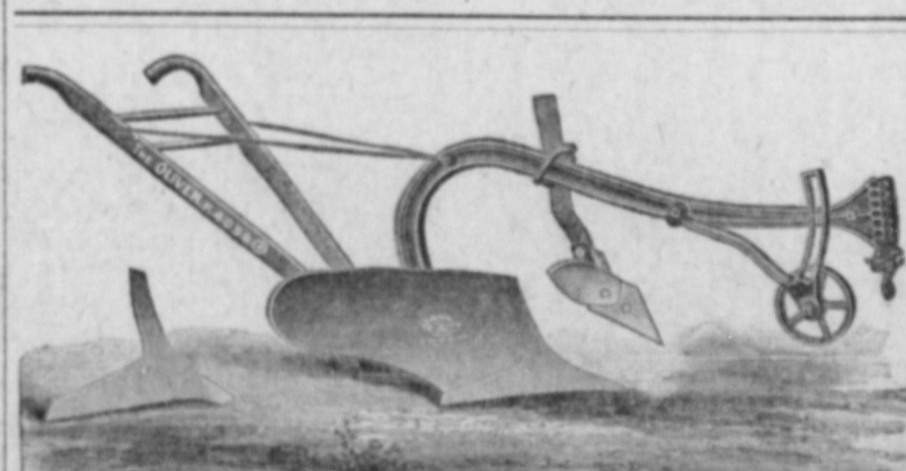
