The Scarlet Fever Situation.

Since the last issue of the paper on-ly two or three new cases of scarlet fever have been reported to the local authorities and these, together with the old cases, have been recovering very rapidly. The strict precautions exercised by those in charge of the public health, and the hearty co-operation and willingness on the part of the citizens of the town, have done much to keep down what at first appeared to be a serious epidemic. The Scenic has been closed for a week, the churches were nearly all closed up last Sunday, and a number of social gatherings have been abandoned until 'all danger of contagion is passed. Last Monday evening council met in speeial session and pledged their hearty support to the local board of health in any measures which they may see fit to adopt.
