WHY FAST FREIGHTS ARE A NECESSITY

CONTRIBUTE LARGELY TO PUB. LIC WELFARE.

MANY GOODS ARE PERISHABLE

Without the Excellent Service Conducted by the Pennsylvania Railroad, Many of the Joys of Good Living Would be Curtailed.

A consignment of silk valued at \$140,000 has just arrived at New York from a Chinese port. It was received at its destination seventeen days after the steamer which carried it over the first part of the route left her dock on the other side of the Pacific. The last stage of the journey was made over the Pennsylvania Railroad System, the two carloads of precious cloth leav-ing Chicago in the morning and arriving in Jersey City the next even-

A few years past, seventeen days would have been good time for the trip across the United States. For some classes of freight it is good time now. The perfection of what is known as the "Preference Freight" service has made rapid movements of this kind possible. Instead of tying up \$140,000 for a couple of months as would have been necessary formerly. the importer was able to put his capital into action after two weeks and a half. Think what this means to the importer! Think how much more capital is freed for investment by this rapid freight service! Think what it means to the consumer who now pays the interest on the capital for two weeks and a half instead of a couple

Si'ks may not be a necessity, and saving on them may ail those who can most afford to pay, but how about vegetables and fruits? It touches the mass of people pretty closely to be able to get new potatoes in February instead of waiting till late spring or

The districts surrounding our large cities do not produce enough fruit to supply them, and were it not for fast freight trains, only the rich could ever afford to buy it in the cities. The perfection attained by this service makes it possible for a trainload of peaches leave the Delaware-Maryland-Virginia Peninsula in the early morning and be on the consumers tables the same day. This perfection was brought about by improvements in every department of the railroad organization; by more tracks, more powerful locomotives, larger and heavier cars, gentler grades and fewer curves, and perhaps most of all by the advance in operating methods and the ever increasing resources of managing ability.

The pioneer fast freight organization of America was the Star Union Line, which carries on the through traffic over the Pennsylvania System between the eastern and western lines. For ten years prior to 1873, when it was purchased by the Pennsylvania, it was operated as a private line, having grown out of the business established seventy years ago by Leech and Company of Philadelphia, and Clark and Company of Pittsburg. On the westbound schedule of this

e there are eleven train which leave eastern points lady just as regularly as do the passenger trains; and eastthere is only one less. Thi does not represent the total volume of traffic, however, for only the last sections are scheduled, and advance sections are required so frequently that they are rather the rule than the exception during certain seasons. Not more than thirty car: of preference freight are allowed to an engine, and thus it often takes several trains to carry the day's business from one station. Freight must be kept moving so a train is sent out an hour after the regular starting time if there is a large enough accumulation to warrant it, but this is called the advance section of the train which is due to leave the following day.

Freight from New York, Phila. Baltimore and places similarly located is delivered in from one to three days. according to the zone for which it is destined. In the zone which is one day from New York are Harrisburg. Lancaster, Williamsport, Baltimore, Norfolk, Washington, etc. Cities like Pittsburg, Cleveland, Wheeling, Erie and Buffalo are reached the second day after shipment, while Chicago, Saint Louis, Peoria, Columbus, Dayton, and Cincinnati are in the threedistrict. From other shipping points in either the east or west equally rapid service is given, the sea 93 zones being divided according to the pounds.

On westward runs the Union Line is fed by the immense shipments of merchandise from the great manufacturing centers of the New England States, Newd York, Pennsylvania an New Jersey and by the thousands of tons of fruits and vegetables which come from the South Atlantic states. not all of which go to Eastern markets.

Returning, beside the valuable consignments of silk for New York and Europe from the Orient, there is the enormous fruit crop from the Pacific states to be delivered to the markets spoenfuls. on both sides of the Atlantic.

Almost everything that can be found in a store is included in the preference class, as well as many of the heavier commodities. With a few exceptions it takes in everything from the first through the fifth group according to the official freight classifications.

Owing to the fact that small lots of Treight originate at widely separated points, billed for an equally scattered number of places, it would be impractical to give a separate car to each, and carry it through to its destination.
