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EDITORIAL.

CHRISTMAS.

Christmas comes but once a year. It has come to us, 1911 times—since the birth of Christ. Other holidays may pass from the records of time, but never the Day that is celebrated as the Day when the Savior was born in a manger in Bethlehem.

Carousal upon Christmas day is not a celebration in honor of the birth of the Savior. It is pure sacrilege and mockery—of which no mortal being should be guilty.

Beginning with December 1 it will cost less to send a parcel by mail from London to San Francisco than from Bellefonte to Harrisburg.

BLAMES UNREST ON TRUSTS.

Making the direct charge that the methods of gigantic monopolies are causing a spread of dangerous unrest throughout the United States, Attorney Louis D. Brandeis appeared before the senate committee on interstate commerce.

Mr. Brandeis explained that it is not the object of those supporting the La Follette bill to kill the Sherman antitrust act, but to add to it in order to make it more effective.

The most menacing trust, said Mr. Brandeis, is the Wall Street money trust, whose grip is ever tightening upon the business of America.

Mr. Brandeis considered the trust question from all angles. He said that, with the La Follette bill in force, it would be impossible to form trusts in the future.

A CHANGE OF FRONT.

The national and savings banks of the country bitterly opposed the establishment of postal savings banks. They did so because they feared that postal savings banks would operate to their material disadvantage.

But national and savings banks have learned a thing or two. They have discovered that the postal savings bank system has brought out millions of dollars of idle money and put them into circulation.

There are over 7,000 national banks in the country and a little more than half as many savings banks. There are now 4,000 postal banks with total deposits of over \$12,000,000.

WILL BUILD TROLLEY LINE.

The promoters of this trolley line were here sometime ago with the commission and at that time they assured us that in case the penitentiary was located near Bellefonte they would go ahead and construct their line.

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Will Benefit Bellefonte.

A trolley line to State College would open up a vast section of territory with rapid, convenient, and cheap transportation facilities to the county seat, and with it would come a great deal of trade that now is held in other localities.

At this time it is only just that we give proper credit to those who were active in the securing of this large institution near our town. The untiring efforts of J. Linn Harris, of Bellefonte, who is a member of the State Forestry Commission, deserve the most credit for securing the selection of the McBridge site.

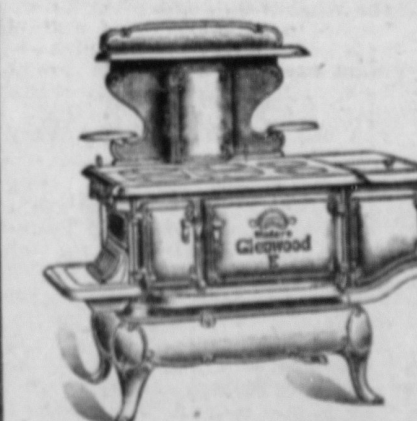
