FROM MONTANA.

The following letter is from one of our Centre county readers in Montana:
We are all very glad, indeed, that we have not been in old Pennsylvania this winter to suffer from your extremely cold weather. Even though we live in Northwestern Montana, we have a far better climate than Penna. We have been plowing since February 15th and the crops are being rapidly put in. We live in one of the most fertile and beautiful valleys in the country, in the recently opened Flathead Indian Reservation. It is literally a "land of promise" and when fully developed and with its completed irrigation project it will rival any similar section in the country.
The scenic beauty of a trip across the reservation is one to be seen, as it cannot be described, and it is conceded by those who travel, that the wealth of beauty not excelled in any country. Here, on the prairie, we are enjoying beautiful spring weather and green fields while less than five miles away the snow lies many feet deep upon the mountains whose peaks are covered by the eternal snows.
We are pioneers on the reservation having been here before it was opened for settlement, and at a time when there were, perhaps, less than fifty whites on the entire reservation, and it has been wonderful to us to see the rapid development of the country. Palson, the metropolis of the reservation, has developed from an Indian trading post, of a few shacks, to a town exceeding 1500 population with modern buildings, electric lights and city water. It has six hotels, a proportionate number of stores, machine shop, brick plant, saw mill, planning mill, five lumber yards, etc. While not so large as Polson, yet the towns of Ronan, St. Ignace, Dixon, Camas, Big Arm and Dayton have had the same rapid and healthy growth.
Ronan enjoys the distinction of having more irrigated land tributary to it than any other town in the United States. Further, we are all "boosters" out here. No one can live in the Mission valley and not boost. It's in the atmosphere and gets into our veins. Even those who forced, I say forced because no one ever leaves the reservation unless forced to go, by business or other reasons, to leave the valley, keep on boosting ever after as a sort of recompense for having been permitted to see its splendor and enjoy its invigorating atmosphere.
Well, I have trespassed long enough on your time, so will close; with best wishes for the continued prosperity of "The Centre Democrat" and may it long continue to "Boost" for its own home interests.
