

SOME OLDTIME FISHING.

Fishing season having opened up for the 1912 season, it may be interesting to refer to fishing in the olden days when there was no fly or lure or regulate the sport. The common angler did not have the fly to lure the gamey trout, but used the wriggling earth worm and various bugs for bait. The scoopnet was then in full commission and parties with one or more of those nets, and two characters to each net, to drive them into the stream, covered a space in the stream of half dozen rods, and captured suckers and other fish in great numbers. Trout, being more abundant and wary, would manage to dodge the scoop nets and escape except the capture of an occasional one of the speckled beauties. Scoopnet fishing, as given above, was common sport and resulted in profit to the fishermen in rich hauls.

Then there was fishing by letting off a mill dam once every few years, and with scoop nets capture several barrels of fish. When a miller found that his dam needed looking after to make repairs and for cleaning, a day was appointed for letting off the dam, and all the patrons of the mill were invited for the frolic, and few would fail to be on hand. Several barrels of fish would be scooped up along with some slippery eels. When the fishing was called off, a list of the participants was made, and the fish divided up into piles in corresponding numbers. All being in readiness, one from the crowd was chosen as teller, and with back turned to the piles of fish, another would point to a pile and the teller was to name whose pile that should be, until each pile had its owner, who oft had as many fish as he could carry home.

This sort of fishing, under the present fishing laws is prohibited. Otherwise the fish warden may scoop you into his net, assisted by his chasers. The mountain streams, in those days, as now, were the purely trout streams, without limit as to size or number for a catch.

Licenses Held Up in Snyder Co. All of the twenty-seven retail and three wholesale liquor license applications last Saturday were held up by Judge Johnson in the license court.

Former Judge Harold M. McClure, attorney for the anti-booze people, filed remonstrances against all applications, and three consternation into the opposition by proving that not one of the license applications had been legally advertised. He announced at the court session Saturday night that he will bring specific charges for selling to minors and on Sunday against six retailers.

The temperance people say that, in the county as a whole, the anti-booze people have signed remonstrances against a total of 3,500 who are on the license petitions.

The court room was crowded, many of the spectators being women bearing American flags and wearing the white ribbon badge of the Women's Christian Temperance Union. Each person who entered the court room was buttonholed at the entrance and if found to be opposed to licenses, was equipped with the double badge of flag and white ribbon.

An Old Methodist Gone. On Sunday afternoon the obsequies of Mrs. Hannah Hicks, aged 93 years, Centre county's oldest woman and one of the three oldest women in Central Pennsylvania was held. Had Mrs. Hicks lived until next October she would have reached the century mark. She was a member of the Half Moon Methodist Episcopal church and besides being the oldest woman in the county, she was, also, the oldest communicant of the Methodist Episcopal faith in Centre, Blair and Huntingdon counties. She retained her faculties unimpaired until a few days before her death and could recall the stirring events of early American history with the details of a person half her years.

The funeral services Sunday were in charge of the Rev. Marion J. Runyan, pastor of the Half Moon Methodist church. Interment was made in the Graysville cemetery.

Surveys Started. Ten State Highway engineers started work at Tyrone this week, and are headed for Clearfield by way of Osceola and Philipsburg. Another corps is working from Grampian to Driftwood by way of DuBois.

SICK MAN CATCHES TROUT.

Speckled Beauties Taken in Bucket to Patient in Hospital. One of the fish stories provided during the early days of the trout season, which certainly has the charm of novelty is the following from Thursday evening's Williamsport News: "B. C. Bowman, manager of the Bowman Hat company, managed to enjoy trout fishing, despite the fact that he is a patient in the Koser sanitarium. Mr. Bowman is an enthusiastic fisherman and when he submitted to an operation at the Koser hospital a week ago he greatly regretted that he would not be able to wander along a trout stream during the first few weeks of the season.

"Fred Schantz solved the difficulty and Wednesday put in an appearance at the sanitarium with a long pole, a bucket and a box of bait. The bucket contained a dozen live trout and in several hours Mr. Bowman had succeeded in landing all of the fish with the aid of a few angle worms and the line and pole provided. Mr. Bowman says that fishing from a bank, Mr. Bowman today was reported as being greatly improved and will be able to fish from a creek bank within a few weeks.

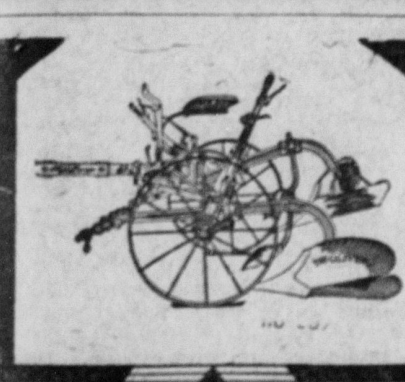
