

DEMOCRATS PROTEST.

Resolutions Passed Denouncing Crooked Primary Methods. The county chairmen, the delegates and other prominent Democrats in Jim Hall's congressional district met at Oil City recently and passed a set of resolutions that clearly indicate Hall's political alliance with the Republican machine.

The resolutions follow: Whereas, The recent primary vote of Elk county and the attempted nomination of by so-called Elk county Democrats of Peter M. Speer, Esq., as the Democratic candidate for congress in this district demonstrates that the pseudo-Democratic organization of that county, now, as for years it has been, dominated by State Senator J. K. P. Hall, of Allentown convention notoriety, his henchmen, Dennis J. Driscoll, Elk county Democratic chairman, John A. Flynn, Elk county Democratic and republican candidate for Legislature, jointly nominated in the recent primaries by the Hall-Penrose combination, and others of their political ilk and political methods. In palpable violation of the spirit of the primary law of 1906 and as the result of a self-evident deal to nominate and secure the election of Peter M. Speer, Esq., the standpat Republican candidate for Congress, cast with the exception of ten Democratic votes the entire Democratic vote of Elk county for Speer, thereby utterly ignoring the rights of John P. Hines, Esq., Democratic candidate for Congress and thereby alone defeating General Hulings the progressive Republican anti-machine candidate for Congress.

Justify Condemnation. "And, Whereas, The results so indicated evidence a party treachery hatched by the so-called Elk County Hall Democratic Organization surpassing in unblushing effrontery and infamy all former perfidies of the Penrose-Hall machine in this county and which justify unqualified condemnation by all honorable men regardless of party affiliations.

"And, Whereas, It is our opinion that no self-respecting candidate of any party would or ought to accept a nomination for public office under such or similar circumstances. "We, the undersigned Democrats in meeting assembled, representing the unanimous conviction of all self-respecting Democrats in this Congressional district and practically all of the entire Democratic vote therein exclusive of Elk county, hereby unqualifiedly condemn the methods mentioned of the Penrose-Hall machine and direct and empower all delegates from Warren, Venango and Mercer counties to the next Democratic State convention who are not the venaal vassals of such machine to present an appropriate resolution and to take proper action hereon to the end that such methods shall be rebuked by the Democracy of the State and that the so-called Elk county Hall-Penrose Democratic organization as at present dominated, be eliminated from further Democratic recognition."

Names Signed to Resolutions. Attached to the resolutions are the following names: Frank P. Frank, district chairman, 24th Congressional district; C. E. Bordwell, chairman of Warren county; George Zuendell, chairman Forest county; John P. Hines, chairman Mercer county; J. L. Nesbitt, chairman Venango county; A. S. Martin, secretary, Venango county; William Hasson, William J. Breene, L. B. Rowley, T. J. Callahan, S. E. Walker, E. S. Smith, P. H. Shields, James Hasson, Frank P. McCut, Edmond C. Breene, P. H. Culbertson, P. A. Wilber and others.

Asked to Resign. Petitions are being circulated in Sharon and throughout the twenty-eighth congressional district, and are being generally signed by Republican voters, demanding of Representative Peter M. Speer that he withdraw as the Republican nominee for congress in favor of General William Hulings, who, the petitions state, received the majority of the Republican votes at the recent primary and is the legitimate candidate. The petitions are circulated because of alleged gross frauds in Elk county, and it is understood that should Speer refuse the demand made upon him, a contest in the courts will be started immediately. Speer is a stand-patter, who has the backing of the Standard Oil politicians.

FOR GOOD ROADS.

Congress Favors Appropriations For Good Country Roads. "We favor federal aid to state and local authorities in the construction and maintenance of good roads." This was a Democratic pre-election promise. It was a plank in the platform adopted by the National Democratic Party at the Denver convention in 1910.

This pre-election promise, along with many others, one made by the Democrats on the stump in the last campaign, has been fulfilled. The Democratic House of Representatives has just passed the Shackelford amendment to the Postoffice appropriation bill providing for an expenditure of from ten to eighteen million dollars annually for the construction and improvement of the nation's roads.

The principle on which it is proposed to spend this money is based on compensation to the Federal government for the use of roads traversed by carriers in the rural free delivery service, and is divided into three classes, as follows:

Class "A"—The highest form of improved road in the country, for which it is proposed to pay \$25 per mile per year.

Class "B"—A thoroughfare of high quality, but not equal to class "A", for which it is proposed to pay \$20 per mile per year.

Class "C"—The ordinary dirt road of the country, somewhat improved, for which it is proposed to pay \$15 per mile per year.

Sentiment in favor of road improvement with money now being wasted for fake commissions—the Canadian boundary commission—which exists solely to provide soft berths for lame duck politicians like Tawney of Minnesota—is growing rapidly throughout the country. For many years, too, the people who live in the farming communities, and in the smaller cities and towns, have felt that too much of the public money was being spent in the large cities. In the last 10 years fully 90 per cent. of the public revenue has been spent in the cities, notwithstanding the fact that the people of the country have furnished more than half of all the money collected by the government.

Neither the states nor the national government will be the loser by generous expenditure for public road construction, for the money will ultimately come back through the increase in the taxable value of farm lands. Nor is it that the only way it will come back. Whatever makes for the agricultural development of the country also aids other industries in the land. All classes of good crops, and the transportation of same at economical cost, for prosperity.

ANOTHER TO GO.

Representative John Dalzell of Pittsburgh belongs to the tradition of Republicans of whom Gen. Penrose was a fair type. His defeat for renomination at the primaries creates another vacancy in the ranks of the Old Guard, of whom ex-Speaker Cannon and Representative Payne are the principal survivors.

Representative Dalzell has served continuously since he was first elected to the Fifth Congress. Since the recent death of Gen. Bingham of Philadelphia, only ex-Speaker Cannon and Representative Payne outrank him in length of service. He has the same fate as Boutwell, Illinois and Hull of Iowa, who in 1910 were denied renomination by their own party.

Such men had little business as leaders of their party when it took up tariff revision as a fixed policy. They were out of sympathy with the spirit of the times. The McKinley and Dingley tariffs, whose schedules were written by the protected interests, represented their ideals.

As a member of the Ways and Means Committee, second only to Representative Payne, who was the Tariff bill of 1909 was before the House, Representative Dalzell was one of those who bitterly derided the idea of a tariff commission. A board of experts that should know better the degree of protection that the steel industry needed than the steel interests of Dalzell's own district in Pennsylvania was inconceivable to him.

The times have changed but Representative Dalzell has remained of the same mind, and in a few months he must make room for a type of different and broader type.—World.
