

FOOD FOR 1,300.

Circus Commissary Man Tells How He Beats High Cost of Living.

"If some of the housekeepers who do all their buying over the telephone would go to market like their mothers did, there wouldn't be so much talk about the high cost of living."

A circus man made this remark and added to it that he did the food buying for a family of 1,300 people and for three meals a day. The man was A. L. Webb, the commissary of the Ringling Brothers' circus, which for more than 20 years has held this position.

"Circus people run to brawn and muscle and we have to feed them well. Our dining tent is a model of cleanliness, and we have fresh, new linen at hand. All of the meat is bought in carcasses, for we carry four butchers in addition to the 96 cooks and waiters in this department. This season I have had the ranges built on a wagon, so that when dinner is over the fire can be thrown out the sides, and the eight-horse team pull it to the depot."

"We have steam tables and also steam for the soup cauldrons. Everybody gets the same fare, for the Ringlings have always set a good table. In case of a long Sunday run, we have to set up, we make up 780 lunch boxes for each meal, mixed by the working men. The other people get their meals on the lunch cars of our four trains. We bake on the lot every day 300 pies and about 30 square feet of cake."

"For breakfast the first order is always 4,700 griddle cakes, and in a day we use up four barrels of flour. All of this moves with ease and no noise and confusion, and as I said before, that in feeding this multitude, by careful buying and doing it personally, we have not found any high cost of living."

"As an idea of how our circus people live on the lot, here is the menu we have bought for the dinner on Sunday, and everyone will be served alike: Two kinds of soup, fish, lettuce salad, roast beef, roast pork, four vegetables, coffee and tea, pie, ice-cream and cake. Sounds almost like home doesn't it?"

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FORTUNE IN OLD VIOLIN.

Owner Didn't Know It Until Stranger Bid \$7,500 on Street.

Finding himself suddenly possessed of a violin evidently of immense value, Charles Riley, a farmer, of Gettysburg, of moderate circumstances, is now happy over the turn of affairs which has evidently made the rest of his life free from financial care.

Riley thought little of his possession until, coming to Gettysburg, he was accosted on the street by a tourist, who offered \$50 for the violin. Suspecting the instrument was worth more, Riley refused the offer. Gradually the bidder increased his offer until he reached \$7,500, which Riley still refused. Later in the day another effort was made by another party to secure the instrument, but Riley is holding on to it until he learns its real value.

The violin bears the date 1793 rudely carved and its history has been traced back some 300 years. It was at one time in the possession of persons in South America, but first came into the possession of the Riley family when the father purchased it at public sale for a mere song.
