

# THE WOODROW WILSON LEAGUE

## ITS AIMS AND OBJECTS

AT THE Baltimore Convention the Pennsylvania delegation said, "Give us Wilson and we will give you Pennsylvania." This promise must be redeemed and the Woodrow Wilson League as organized is going to play an important part in the plans of Pennsylvania's Democracy to make good the pledge given at Baltimore.

The purpose of the League is to encourage and assist in the formation into clubs and organizations, without regard to previous party alignment or affiliation, all those individuals who earnestly desire the election of Woodrow Wilson and Thomas R. Marshall for President and Vice President; to secure the co-operation and support of the permanent Democratic Clubs and to unite such clubs for effective and organized work in advancing the candidacy of Wilson and Marshall.

Pennsylvania is a large state and the work this League has undertaken is a tremendous one, but the instant and enthusiastic response which met the first announcement of its plans, is most encouraging. Already nearly 100 clubs have been organized. Many independent Republicans have already joined the League and applications are coming in daily in great numbers.

It is the desire of the Woodrow Wilson League to organize a club in every voting precinct in the State. Clubs need not be formed on a lavish or extravagant style. Permanent headquarters are, of course, most desirable, but not absolutely necessary. In some instances private houses are secured, in some an unoccupied store, and not a few have headquarters in barber shops and one club meets weekly at a cross roads blacksmith shop.

The method of organization is simplicity itself. Secure the co-operation of one or two other Wilson men, prepare a call for a meeting, which may be simply a statement like this:

A Meeting to Form a Woodrow Wilson Club will be held on \_\_\_\_\_ evening at 8 o'clock at \_\_\_\_\_  
Every voter interested in securing the election of Wilson and Marshall is cordially invited to attend this meeting.

Copies of this call may be printed, typewritten or written in long hand and mailed or delivered to all independent voters in your district. Do not restrict the invitations to Democrats. Remember Governor Wilson got more than 50,000 Republican votes in New Jersey.

At the meeting, observe the following outline and order of business:

1. Secure signatures to roll of all who wish to join.
2. Read call for meeting.
3. Nomination and election of temporary officers to consist of a chairman and one secretary.
4. Call roll.
5. Nomination and election of permanent officers.
6. Appointment of committees as follows:

Constitution.  
Resolutions.  
Membership.  
Finance.  
Campaign Work.

7. Report of committees.
8. New business.
9. Adjournment.

Upon the formation of a Wilson Club, mail at once to central headquarters, 145 South Broad street, the names and addresses of members. A certificate of membership in the Wilson League will then be issued to your club. You will also receive literature, buttons, and other campaign material upon application. Upon the organization of the club, get all the members busy securing new members. Every man should enroll ten additional members at least.

No one needs past political experience to organize a Wilson Club. We want energetic young men to become active in this campaign.

In the latter part of September, delegates from all the Wilson Clubs in Pennsylvania will visit Governor Wilson at Sea Girt. Be sure your club is organized in time to send a representative. Above all, let your local newspaper know about it, send the editor complete list of officers, etc.

The chairman and secretary and all members of the Committee on Organization are at your disposal at all times. Keep in touch with central headquarters or with the representative of the Organization Committee in your respective congressional district. See full list of committees on another page.
