BULL MOOSE MEETING.

Their First Meeting in Bellefonte, last

Saturday. The Bull Moose party had their inning in the court house on Saturday evening. The band was on hand to stir up enthusiasm, and it was noticeable that a number of Bull Moosers from distant parts of the county were in attendance. For a Saturday night there was little more than the usual crowd in town. Owing to the speakers arriving on the 8:30 train the meeting was a little late in starting. The front of the court room was only partly filled while in the rear and about the door many stood in the aisles and at the entrance. The audience contained a small per cent, of ladies, also quite a lot of boys. It was a good audience, in which there were many staunch Democrats who came to hear the Bull Moose issues present-

Theodore Boal, of Boalsburg, preand entertaining. The greater portion of his talk was devoted to a discussion of President Taft's failures and shortcomings. He also severely criticised the attitude of the Republican party on the tariff question, declaring that it was creating monopoly in the interest of the manufacturers at the expense of the great body of consumers. He reiterated the arguments that the Democratic party has made for years; and the way the Bull Moose Republicans applauded this new confession of faith was amusing. They thereby actually denounced what they had been voting for these many years. He also spoke lightly of the Constitution as being an old, out-ofdate instrument that had served its usefulness, and now should be radically modified to conform to the Bull Moose platform. With this exception, he made a splendid Democratic speech, yet the converted Republicans applauded heartily, showing that they had undergone a change of heart.

H. Fred Mercer broke forth with a likewise denounced the President for his lack of sympathy with the masses. and he also denounced the system of tariff legislation that was robbing the masses for the benefit of the privi ileged classes-and the converted Republican Bull Moosers applauded more heartily than ever, Chairman Locke usually giving the signal for the demonstration to begin. Mr. Mercer flayed the President unmercifully for some of his utterances. He also insisted that the Constitution, prepared by our fathers, was an old and antedated instrument that should be modified to suit the Bull Moosers. His speech, like his predecessors, was mainly a reiteration of Democratic doctrines and the Bull Moosers en-

While the meeting was well attended, it failed to arouse the enthusiasm that was anticipated.

KILLED IN SAW MILL.

Sinking Valley Farmer Ground to Pieces.

While working about his sawmill at the Kettle, in Sinking valley, Thursday morning, of last week, Robert Cochran, a farmer and owner of the mill, met a horrible death. His blouse caught on the big saw and in an instant his body was pulled over the saw, cut into four pieces and hurled far from the death dealing blade. few feet away, the unfortunate man's wife was an eye witness to the trage-She was powerless to move, for in one instant her helpmate was joking with her, in a trice his mangled bleeding corpse was lying at her feet. Cochran has a mill set up, which he operated with the occasion al help of an assistant. His assistant was not working Thursday, and he was engaged in cutting out scantling. to be cut through twice. After running a load through the first time, the man walked back of the saw to place the cut timbers on a carriage to be re-turned to the front of the saw, and run through the second time.

The farmer had the reputation among his neighbors of wearing an unusually loose blouse while working about the saw. In the position he stood, the saw was turning away from him. A slight puff of wind blew the corner of his blouse over the saw. In an instant he was pulled down on top of the whirling teeth, but only for an instant, the centrifugal force hurling the body almost at the feet of Mrs. Cochran. In the brief instant the saw had cut through the left leg below the knee, severing the leg cleanly. The right leg and hip were cut off close to the body, while the right arm was almost severed at the shoulder blade.

Death mercifully, was instantaneous. The wife swooned away. After re-gaining consciousness she left the mill and summoned aid of a rural mail carrier who was passing. The mailman passed the word along, and neighbors soon hurried to the scene. The body was taken to Altoona and prepared for burial.
