### HISTORICAL SKETCH.

(Continued from last week.)

Franklin B. Smith disposed of his store business to Smith, Gregg & Co., and they to Samuel Lipton. Mr. Lip-ton had been a shoemaker in Milesburg; he put up a store room and was for many years a village merchant; he died about 1850.

Samuel Patton kept store on the opposite corner and after him Miles & Potts; Enos Miles was perhaps the first village tailor; he came from Chester county in 1810, and after a stay of six years moved to Howard, and in 1830 returned. He died in Milesburg in 1850. His son Zackarlah was a res-ident of the village for many years. In 1819 Daniel Hildridge and Anthony Peters made shoes for the villagers. Archie McMullin was blacksmith and wagon maker, and had his shop on the present site of Miles' store. James McMaster was also a wagon maker good luck to you, Elmer. and blacksmith and had his shop on nery on the creek and ground his bark by means of a rough mill stone William Barger, of Alto bark by means of a rough mill stone which was turned by horse-power. Geo. I. Miles had a tannery on the property now owned by Joseph Baird, John Glenn, when he entered the ministry leased it to Shirk, who operated it for spe twenty years. The Milesburg postoffice was the first one established in what is now territory of Centre county-March 13, 1797. Joseph Green was appointed postmaster, and some of those who were postmasters since were, Joseph Green. Jr., 1832; Isaac Buffington. Samuel Patton, C. G. Ryman; in 1841 Buffington was again appointed; Joseph Snell succeeded him in 1845; J. S. udfoot in 1853; J. B. Hahn 1865; Richard Miles 1866; Samuel Bing 1868; David Glenn, 1869; Zeckariah Miles, 1880; Joshua Mitchel, 1883. Several postmasters served in the intervening years, between 1883 and 1900, when A. F. Boggs the present postmaster was appointed, and has served for twelve onsecutive years

#### Revolutionary Soldiers.

Anthony Peters joined the army when he was only sixteen years old, in the spring of 1777, in Jacob Weaver's Company, Tenth Penna. Regiment, and took part in the battle of Rising Sun. below Germantown; also the bat tle of Monmouth; and on the attack of the block house, under Wayne. His Company served a year longer than they had enlisted for, having alserved eighteen months in Col. Butler's Regiment, and was discharged when the war terminated.

Charles McCain was born in 1752; he enlisted from Centre county on Sept. 30, 1775, in Captain Wilson's Company, who was succeeded after his death by John Robb. He marched from Centre county to Marcus Hook, then to New York, and took part in the battle of Long Island, Aug. 27, 1776; he was wounded in several places and taken prisoner by the British, but made his escape the next night. He took part in the battles of Brandy Wine and Germantown and discharged at Valley Forge, Jan. Rishel 1778. He afterwards enlisted in a Company of light dragoons at Carlisle and served until the discharge of the army in 1783. He resided in a house in Milesburg that his fatherin-law had given to his wife, and died there in 1823 or 1824.
