





#### CRESSON SANATORIUM OPENS.

Patients are arriving daily at the newly opened State Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Cresson. Dr. Samuel G. Dixon, Commissioner of Health, recently completed an inspection of the buildings and has expressed himself as well pleased with the institution which comprises every modern feature of Sanatorium construction. The main structures include an ad-

ministration, diningroom and ward buildings. In addition there are twenby cottage units. The capacity of the samatorium with the present buildings is 340 patients which will eventually be increased by addition of other wards. Provisions have been made in the plans for three more of these without necessitating any increase in the diningroom or administration buildings. Architecturally the new institution

is handsome in design. The English half timber effect chosen has given opportunity for the use of a beautiful reddish yellow stone quarried on the state property. This in connecwith the grey asbestos roofing \*tion and paneling comprises a most attractive color scheme.

The buildings are so located that each portion of them obtains the maxn amount of sunlight and fresh The elevation of the institution mair. and its freedom from contaminating railroad and factory smoke insures the purity of the air which is so es-

sential to the satisfactory treatment of pulmonary tuberculosis. At the same time it is located within easy treach of the main artery of travel be-tween the eastern and western portions of the state which make it readily accessible


