HISTORICAL SKETCH.

Borough Incorporation .- By act No. 19, approved March 3rd, 1843, Milesburg was incorporated as a borough. Section one of the act provides, That the town of Milesburg in Centre county and territory included in the following boundaries, to wit: Begin-ning at the junction of Bald Eagle and Spring Creeks at low water mark, thence up the banks of Spring Creek to the line of James Irvin & Co land; thence along the south eighty-two degrees east thirteen perches to the cor-ner of Joseph Miles' meadow, south sixty-nine degrees, east forty-five perches to turnpike road, north fiftytwo degrees, east along the division fence of Joseph Miles, forty-four perches; thence north twenty-seven degrees west fourteen perches to the corner of Wm. Lee's lot; thence north sixty-four degrees east sixteen perches to back line of town lots; thence north fifty-two degrees east, along the same forty-three perches to the east side of Catherine St., thence north thirtyfive degrees west along the east side of Catherine st. forty perches and fivesixteenths to the corner of Baptist church lot; thence north fifty-five degrees east twelve perches to the east corner of school house; thence north thirty-five degrees west ten perches to the north corner of the graveyard; thence north corner of the graveyard; along the line of graveyard, sixteen perches to Catherine St.; thence north thirty-five degrees west along the east side of Catherine St., thirty-two perches to the Bald Eagle creek; thence along the same to the place of

Detroit, Mich., Jan. 26, 1913. Editor Centre Democrat,

Since you published my letter of Jan-uary 12th, I am besieged with letters from all over the county of Centre from men requesting me to secure employment for them, which is impossi-ble for me to do. When they need men at these factories they want them at once and the first man or men that make application for work are engag-ed and put to work at once. Men are in demand all the time and it is no trouble for a man who wants to work to get a position here in Detroit. Wages are good and pay day every Saturday and it is a pleasure to work for people who honor and respect their employes. took a trip up the river to Lake St. Clair and saw a farmer hauling in corn fodder which made me think that people here don't know on what day of the week they should let their horses rest, if they need no rest themselves. It is a deplorable thought that in a civilized country as ours, God and the Sabbath are so much disrespected as they are here.

I have a letter before me from a subscriber of the Centre Democrat whose address is Charlotte, Michigan, and am glad to know that your paper has so large a scope of circula-tion. This man, Mr. Alexander from Charlotte, Mich., is a native of dear old Centre Co., Pa., and like myself is Pennsylvania Dutchman.
