Annual Gathering at State College-Inter-Scholastic Meet.

The fourth annual conference high school principals was held at College Friday afternoon and evening, May 2nd., and over sixty representatives from the different parts of the state were in attendance. Questions of mutual interest of high schools and instructors of freshman classes in the colleges were discussed in an informal way.

The conference was under the direction of Dr. S. E. Weber, professor of education, and was informal. Many interesting suffects were discussed.

The interscholastic meet was held on Beaver Field at 1:30 and was the ost successful track meet ever held at the college. It was attended by over 2000 visitors. The weather was ideal and the sixteen schools that participated showed remarkable ability as ten new records were the out-

The schools were graded into two classes, A and B. In the first were Bellefonte academy, Indiana normal, Mercersburg academy and Kiski prep. In the second were the following high schools: Beaver Falls, Bellefonte, Harrisburg, Lock Haven, Milton, Mount Carmel, Philipsburg, Sewickley, Plymouth and Johnstown.

In the academy class Indiana State normal won with a margin of three points over Mercerburg. In the high school class Harrisburg won by a safe margin of 25 points. Besides medals as prizes J. G. White, Penn State '82, gave a handsome silver cup to the best school winning in the meet. The cup went to Harrisburg.

Penn State gave three scholarships as prizes, one for the high school securing the highest number of points, which Harrisbur- won; another for the academy securing the highest number of points, which Indiana won, and a third for the individual scoring the highest number of points, which went to McMasters, of Sewickley High school. Robinson, of Mercersburg, who ran the 100 and 220-yard dashes in 9 3-5 and 20 4-6 seconds. respectively, and McMasters of Sewickley, High, who pole vaulted 14 feet and won the highest number of individual points. Harrisburg High won the mile relay and carried home the flag with her other trophies.
