The Next Mistress of the White House. With the outgoing of Mrs. William Howard Taft, whom the country has loved and honored, there will go into the White House four most attractive women, the president's wife and his three charming daughters.

It has been said that no more refined, unassuming and considerate leaders of the social set have entered Washington in many days than will be these four.

Mrs. Wilson has never essayed to social leadership. She has been much in social life, both as the wife of a university president and mistress of a gubernatorial mansion, but her home is her life. The social glamour of the White House has no appeal for Mrs. Wilson and her daughters, although they are admirably fitted for the high social position. Mrs. Wilson is democratic in manner and life as well as in politics. Her daughters, it has been said, are not only like their mother, but also resemble their distinguished father.

Simple tastes, simple demands, simple living without frills or pretenses, will be their part. Mrs. Wilson was the daughter of a Presbyterian minister, and she has never departed from her "raising." Her ideals of life are high and religious. She is a wide reader and an entertaining talker and an artist of considerable ability. The charms of the three daughters will readily make for them a place in the hearts of Washington society and of the nation.

Margaret Wilson, the eldest, is twenty-six. She is probably the plainest of the three sisters. She is a short, slender, blond girl, wiry and vivacious. She loves golfing, fishing or a dashing game of tennis or baseball. She dances gracefully, rides horseback, swims, plays basketball and tells stories and converses as delightfully as her father. Miss Margaret is the musician of the family, with ambitions to make her career on the concert stage. The White House will probably not alter her plans, as she is devoted to her art.

Miss Jessie, the second sister, is the beauty of the trio and also the more serious. She is a social settlement worker and the youngest member of the nation board of the Young Women's Christian association.

Eleanor, the "baby," is the only one who bears a nickname. To her family and to her intimates she is "Nell." Tall, dark and attractive, she is often taken for the oldest of the Wilson sisters. For the last two years she has been studying art at the Philadelphia Academy of Fine Arts. Miss Eleanor is as lively as her eldest sister and brimful of fun.

The next second lady of the land, Mrs. Thomas Riley Marshall, wife of the vice president elect, is not a suffragette, but she is probably one of the cleverest women politicians in the country. She and her husband have never been separated a night through their fifteen years of married life. Mrs. Marshall also enjoys the distinction of being the only woman to accompany her husband as a gubernatorial candidate from one end of Indiana to the other on a speechmaking tour. She is a woman of keen literary appreciation, and the executive mansion at Philadelphia is full of books, but devoid of bookishness. PASSING OF BILLIONS.

The Yardstick For Measuring Space is One Light Year.

If you were asked the distance from San Francisco to London you would not say so many inches, but would give it in miles. If asked the distance from the earth to the sun the answer would be in millions of miles. If asked the distance to the nearest star the answer would not be in millions or billions, but trillions of miles. Even this reply would be too long. Twenty-five million million miles (twenty-five trillion) are too many words, so it is shortened to light years. The yardstick for space is not billions or trillions, but one light year.

This is the difference traversed in one sidereal year, 31,558,149 seconds, by light moving with its sets and fixed specific speed of 186,383 miles per second. Distances traversed by space energy, given by time as in minutes, hours or days, would soon run into cumbersome trillions, so that the time interval used in physics, mathematics, electricity, etc., is always one second.

Say one second. Then while you are speaking radiant energy has traversed a distance nearly equal to a line long enough to reach around the equator of the earth eight times.

Twenty-five thousand billions, the distance of the nearest known star, is condensed in 4.26 light years. This is the passing of miles, for the mile in space is about equal to the one-millionth part of the thickness of a spider's thread in comparison with the length of the room you are in.

Draw a scale with the distance in between the earth and sun equal to three inches, then the distance of the nearest star would be thirteen miles. Space traversed by miles per minute would be almost without meaning, for to go out to the nearest star sun at one mile per minute would require 47,528,000 years, not days.—Edgar Lucien Larkin in New York American.

FACES WORTH KNOWING.

There are three entirely different kinds of ingredients used in making the three different varieties of baking powders on the market, viz.—(1) Mineral-Acid or Alum, (2) Bone-Acid or Phosphate, and (3) Cream of Tartar, derived from grapes. It is important, from the standpoint of health, to know something about these ingredients, and which kind is used in your baking powder.

(1) Mineral-Acid, or Alum, is made from a kind of clay. This clay is mixed with diluted oil of vitriol and from this solution a product is obtained which is alum. Alum is cheap, costs about two cents a pound, and baking powder made with this Mineral-Acid sells from 10 to 25 cents a pound.

(2) Bone-Acid or Phosphate is the basis of phosphate baking powders and the process if fully described in the patents issued to a large manufacturer of a phosphate powder. The U. S. Patent Office Reports give a full and exact description, but the following extract is enough: "Burned bones, after being ground, are put into freshly diluted oil of vitriol and with continual stirring and in the following proportion," etc.

From this Bone-Acid Phosphate baking powders are made; such pow-

ders are made; such powders sell from 20 to 30 cents a pound.

(3) Cream of Tartar exists in all ripe grapes, and flows with the juice when the grapes are pressed. The tartar is subsequently gathered from the cask, boiled with water, and refined, when crystals of Cream of Tartar, white and very pure (separate and are poured. It differs in no respect from the form in which it originally existed in the grape. Cream of Tartar, then, while the most expensive, is the only ingredient that should be used in a baking powder to act upon the soda, as its wholesomeness is beyond question. Cream of Tartar baking powders sell at about 40 to 50 cents a pound.

Such are the facts and every one, careful of the health of the family, should remember this rule:—Baking powders selling from 10 to 25 cents a pound are made of Mineral-Acid; those selling from 20 to 30 cents of Bone-Acid; and those from 40 to 50 cents of Cream of Tartar derived from grapes.

Put some oil of lavender in a saucer and pour hot water over it. Place it in the bedroom and it will keep your room clear of flies and such like pests the warm weather brings us.

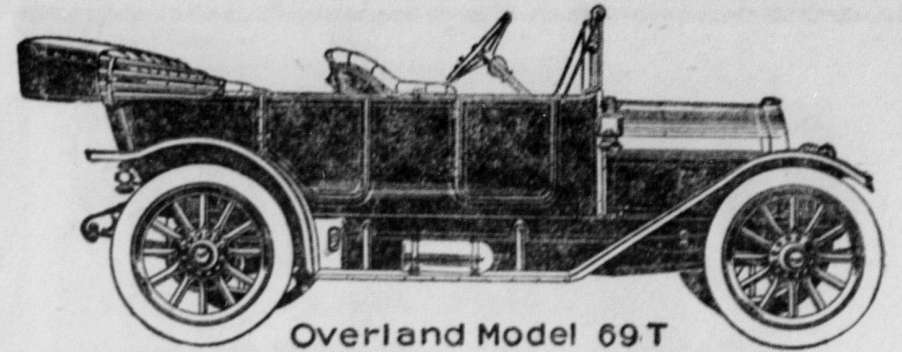
