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**New Law Aids School Taxes.**  
A new law which has just received the approval of Governor Tener gives the school tax collector the power to require the management of all industries to deduct from the pay of employees the amount of their occupation school tax, \$1, in addition to the penalty of five per centum for non-payment at the proper time, making a total of \$1.05.  
The law makes it mandatory for any firm, receiving notice from any school tax collector, requesting the payment of any occupation tax due from any employee, to deduct the same from the wages of such employee and pay it over to the collector.  
Should any firm refuse to make the collection requested by the school tax collector or fail to turn over the amount in thirty days after receiving the proper notice, the firm becomes liable for the entire amount.  
The school taxes will be payable on July 1. The tax will be payable at the flat rate during the months of July, August and September. On October 1, a penalty of five per centum will be added to all unpaid taxes.
