Candidate for State Committeeman. From the Centre Hall Reporter. Dr. Zey, Esq., of Centre, a member of the law firm of Gettitz, Bower & Zey, is a candidate to represent the Democratic party on the state committee. Creasy Boomed for Governor. W. T. Creasy, of Catawissa, master of the State Grange, was boomed for the Democratic nomination for governor at a grangers' picnic at Bally, near Reading, Monday. He delivered an address opposing the proposed \$50,000,000 road bond issue, in which he said: "The grangers were and still are the advocates of the road question. The farmers do not want boulevards only but they want good roads so that they may be able to convey their products to the market and thereby escape the greedy middle man. The bond issue, as it stands, is for boulevards and not good roads."

Situate in the Borough of Bellefonte, County and State of Pennsylvania, bounded and described as follows: to wit: On the north by High street; on the east by lot belonging to the said Daniel Garman Estate; on the south by Cherry alley; and on the west by lot and building of Col.
