#### MORE TROUBLE MAY COME.

Three county jails and three almshouses are down on the books of the State Board of Public Charities as not being in good condition and in spite of notices given to make improvement in the conditions, they have been reported as uncorrected, says a dispatch from Harrisburg to Philadelphia papers Friday. In case nothing is done, the board may exercise the authority conferred upon it by the act of 1913, and lay the matter before the district attorneys of the proper counties for legal action. Under the new law the board has increased powers and may cause trouble for officials neglecting their obligations to maintain sanitary and fitting institutions.

Among the almshouse mentioned as needing correction is one at Sunbury. The board also advises that a new jail is needed for Union county at Lewisburg.

#### Coroner's Jury Exonerates Arick.

The coroner's inquest into the unfortunate death of Daniel Ryer at Curwensville recently was held by Coroner Pollum and his jury Tuesday night and filed with Prothonotary Moore Wednesday. The finding of the jury exonerates Mr. Arick as far as possible as the evidence showed that Ryer was the aggressor and that the fatal blow was struck by Arick in self defense, when attacked by the deceased. Arick was released Thursday by Judge Smith, in the sum of \$5000 bail for his appearance for trial at the February term of court.

Thomas Casey, proprietor of the Central hotel, Curwensville, in which Daniel Ryer was recently killed, has informed Ryer's widow that he will not permit her to suffer by reason of her husband's death.

#### Almost 1,000 Bucks Killed.

Reports made to Dr. Joseph Kalbfus, state game commission secretary, indicate that close to one thousand bucks were shot during the fortnight of the winter season in Pennsylvania. The reports in hand cover many districts not ordinarily heard from at this early date and Dr. Kalbfus says that fewer does were shot than last year.

"The reports indicate that but three people were shot in mistake for deer, which demonstrates that hunters shot before they were sure of their game," said the game official.
