

MORE TROUBLE MAY COME.

Three county jails and three almsbuses are down on the books of the State Board of Public Charities as not being in good condition and in spite of notices given to make improvement in the conditions, they have been reported as uncorrected, says a dispatch from Harrisburg to Philadelphia papers Friday. In case nothing is done, the board may exercise the authority conferred upon it by the act of 1912, and lay the matter before the district attorneys of the proper counties for legal action. Under the new law the board has increased powers and may cause trouble for officials neglecting their obligations to maintain sanitary and fitting institutions.
