TEPA RELEASES 2ND STATEMENT IN STRIKE

own union, and we do not want to belong to any other labor organization," the statement continues. Raising the question as to what group the striking element is affiliated with the TEPA group points out that until March 15, they were being urged to join the A. F. of L. Beginning Monday, March 15 they were implored to join the Committee for Industrial Organization, they state.

Referring to a new labor "agitator" who recently appeared on the scene, the TEPA declares that they do not believe in the use of religion to gain sympathy. "The age of miracles is certainly not past when this new disciple can in a moment's time change cursing and abuse to prayer," the statement points out.

Setting forth that there has been some talk recently regarding constitutional rights, the TEPA holds no constitutional rights are being violated when men who are conscientious with themselves and honest with those dependent upon them, are willing to work and do work and support their families.

In regard to the strikers' declaration that any wage increase that may result from the strike will be devoted to the payment of past-due bills, the TEPA statement claims that they are paying their bills as they go and do not have to ask favors of the merchants. "We give them the favor of our business," the statement adds.

In conclusion the TEPA declared that they are entirely satisfied with their choice, and ask only to be permitted to follow their avocations in peace.

The strikers' committee reports that every effort is being made to induce the Titan management to sit in a conference in the hope that the differences between them can be adjusted. In a statement released Tuesday they set forth that the chief difference is the question of whether the company will permit them to organize and collectively bargain. State agencies have been asked to help in effecting a reconciliation, and if their efforts do not bring results, Federal agencies will be asked to aid the statement continues.

The attitude of the present Centre County relief board is the source of some bitterness among the strikers, the statement says. Workers on strike have been told by representatives of the board to sell their automobiles, borrow on life insurance, or dispose of other assets in order to avoid going on relief.

Such suggestions, the statement adds, given by persons not of mature years, cannot be well received by men and women who have lived long enough to get a fair understanding of life. Some what indignantly it is pointed out, members of poor boards when appealed to for relief, have asked applicants who are strikers to go to work for them, or for some other individual or company.

to keep off the relief rolls. The group hold, however, that to accept such employment would automatically cancel their legal status as employees of the Titan Metal Company.

The statement adds that they feel that no agency of the state or federal government can suggest that the company enter in conferences. This, the strikers hold, is a serious indictment on the door-step of the political state.

Speaking at a labor mass meeting at the Court House, Saturday afternoon, L. W. Rittenhouse, in charge of the striking group at the Titan Metal Company, read his reply to the TEPA statement released the day before.

He added that the TEPA has a perfect right to say whatever they may choose to say, and introduced as the next speaker Attorney Walter Welch, of the Centre County bar.

Mr. Welch stated that he has been affiliated with labor movements since his youth, and is familiar with the tactics used by industry in controlling labor. He declared that while the large majority of employers are sincerely interested in paying fair wages and in giving their employees the best of working conditions, a small group of selfish employers is the cause of unrest throughout the country.

He referred to the abuses which have arisen under the Workmen's Compensation laws through the perversion of the truth by lawyers and physicians. "We are entering a new era," he stated, "and the time has come for us to do our own thinking." The national and State administrations are behind the move for the freedom of labor from economic slavery, he said, and American methods will be used to win the workers' aims.

Chairman of the meeting was John Keeler, of the local Match Workers Union. Rittenhouse, before the meeting closed, named a local attorney who he said was the writer of the TEPA statements. He upheld the religious sincerity of himself and of the striking groups.
