She married H. Kenneth Sauers on February 9, 1929 and is survived by her husband, her parents and one daughter, Ann. A sister, Mrs. Ira Sprankle, of Bellefonte, and a brother, George Tate of Tyrone, also survive. Mrs. Sauers was a member of the State College Methodist Episcopal church. Private funeral services will be held at 2:30 o'clock Friday afternoon at the Kocher funeral home at State College with Rev. H. F. Babcock officiating. Interment will be made at Pine Hill.

MISS BYRD STOVER

On Saturday morning, Miss Byrd Stover, of Rebersburg, passed away at the Centre County Hospital. Her death came as a distinct shock to her relatives and many friends. Possessed of a most pleasing personality and a positive character, she not only made but held friends indefinitely. For years she had been an instructor in music in many parts of Centre and Clinton counties. For more than forty years, she was the teacher of the children in the primary department in the Lutheran Sunday School. She leaves as her nearest relatives the following: A sister, Mrs. Blanche Smull, of Harrisburg; another sister, Mrs. Bessie Meyer, of Somerset; and the following nieces and nephews: Mrs. Rebecca Stetler of Beaver; Miss Ruth Meyer of Wheeling, West Virginia; Mrs. Fay Crowe of Brownsville; and Dean, John and Stover, Meyer, of Somerset. Mrs. Ida Roushie Rumberger, 79, widow of the late Amos Rumberger of Houtzdale, died at her Houtzdale home Thursday last week of complications after an illness of 10 weeks. She was a daughter of the late William and Helen Roushie, born May 22, 1858 at Pine Grove Mills, this county. Married to Amos H. Rumberger October 28, 1885, she went to Houtzdale following her marriage and lived there continuously since that time. Mrs. Rumberger was a prominent Houtzdale merchant. He was in the hardware business, and was Clearfield county treasurer at the time of his death in 1921. Mrs. Rumberger was an active member of the Houtzdale Methodist church. Surviving are these children: Helen, wife of Gus M. Gleason of Johnstown; Edith, wife of Glenn M. Cameron, of Gettysburg; Gertrude, of Houtzdale; wife of Mahlon Haggerty of Phillipsburg and Georgia of Seattle, Washington. FRANK W. BIBLE, D.D.

Frank W. Bible, D.D., died at his home in Oak Park, Ill., Monday, November 15th. He was born in Milesburg, July 18th, 1877, a son of Frank E. Bible and Alice Miner Bible. He received his early education in the schools of Bellefonte, prepared for college at the old Spring Mills Academy and graduated from Park College in 1901. He received a B.A. in Theology from Seminary the same year and was graduated and ordained in the Presbyterian Ministry in 1904. He went to China in 1904 under appointment as the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions and served until 1918, when because of impaired health he returned to the United States. For many years he has been one of the Secretaries of the Foreign Missions Board of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. His headquarters have been in Chicago and because of his work, his contacts with ministers and laymen from New York to the Pacific Coast have made him personally and intimately acquainted with more men than perhaps any other man of his church. He is survived by his wife, the former Henrietta Caskey Bible, of Mifflin, and by a son and three daughters, Frank W. Bible, Jr., Mrs. William Dickson, Miss Beatrice Bible, Miss Barbara Bible, all living in Oak Park, Ill.; a sister, Miss Alice M. Bible, of Westfield, N. J., and a brother, Guy P. Bible, of Philadelphia. He was a nephew of Dr. George F. Bible, of East Curdin street, Bellefonte. The body was brought to Bellefonte for burial and interment was made in the Union cemetery. Funeral services were held in charge of the Rev. William Thompson of the Presbyterian church, and the Rev. Robert Sudlow, of St. John's Episcopal church.

Mrs. Grace M. Mong, wife of Luther Mong, of Pleasant Gap, died suddenly and unexpectedly at the Centre County Hospital at 9:23 o'clock yesterday morning after an illness which began early last Friday morning. The field, yesterday, was in fair condition, but both teams stuck principally to straight football. The first score of the game came in the first quarter. Bellefonte attempted a toss of three kicks, all of which were blocked by alert Jersey Shore men. The third blocked kick resulted in a touchdown for Jersey Shore when Jarmoska recovered the ball in the safety zone. They failed to make the extra point. Bellefonte retaliated in the second period when they marched steadily down the field to put Pettigling in scoring range. Gordon kicked the extra point, making the score 7 to 6. The third quarter saw both teams struggling for the upper hand, but neither was able to get within striking distance of the goal.

In the last frame Jersey Shore fumbled on the 30-yard line. Bellefonte recovered and in a series of rushes through center and off tackle, got a first down on the 1-yard stripe. Witmer carried the ball over the line on the next play. Gordon's try for the extra tally went wide. Late in the last quarter Jersey Shore started a last-minute drive from their own 35-yard line, and in a series of plays succeeded in advancing the ball to Bellefonte's 19-yard line. There they were held on downs just as the final whistle blew. Martin and Waite, two of the Red and White's outstanding players, were not in the game because of injuries.
