PENN STATE PLANS AIR CURRENT STUDY

Atmospheric conditions and air currents above the Allegheny mountains will be studied by Dr. Landsberg, assistant professor of geophysics in the School of Mineral Industries at the Pennsylvania State College, and his students in meteorology.

A series of pilot balloon ascents will be made carrying aloft instruments which will record weather conditions found many thousands of feet above the ground.

Several experimental balloons have already been launched. They are of a height of 11 miles, within the stratosphere, and drifted eastward at 53 miles an hour, dropping to the ground near Lebanon, 30 miles east of State College.

Dr. Landsberg says that the tests will be of importance in the application of the new methods of air mass analysis to weather forecasts.

SOIL SURVEYS CONDUCTED IN TWENTY SEVEN COUNTIES

Detailed soil surveys have been completed in 27 Pennsylvania counties, Howard W. Higbee, assistant professor of soil technology at the Pennsylvania State College, reports.

During the next ten years surveys were completed in Bedford, Blair, Bradford, Cambria, Clearfield, Erie, Lancaster, Lehigh, Mercer, Washington and York counties.

Timely Reminders of The Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture

Best Storage for Apples—Experiments indicate that well-sprayed, carefully handled apples picked at proper maturity keep better than 32 degrees, the temperature range which has been considered ideal for apple storage, Penn State fruit specialists report.

Clean Up Gardens—If the fall clean-up is to be most effective in cleaning up, it should include removing or burning all dead plant parts, plowing under all weeds and around vegetable plots, say Penn State plant pathologists.

Grow Christmas Trees—Growing Christmas trees as a regular plan and managed crop is started on a few farms in Pennsylvania slightly more than 10 years ago.
