During the next ten years surveys were completed in Bedford, Blair, Bradford. Cambia, Clearfield, Erie, Lancaster, Lehigh, Mercer, Washngton, and York counties. From 1920 to 1930 Adams, Greene, Lycoming. Tioga, and Wyoming counties were completely surveyed. Since 1930 the following counties have been urveyed: Armstrong. Bucks, Frank-Huntingdon, Indiana,
