GOLDEN TEXT: "Come unto me all ye that labor and are heavy laden and I will give you rest."—Matthew 11:28.

Lesson Text: Matthew 11:28-30; Hebrews 4

Reuben H. Shock, who said he held up a county bank in 1931 to pay off his mortgage, has appealed to the Pardon Board for freedom.

Shock, who was 41 in 1931, when the Farmers National Bank of Exchange, 28 miles from Williamsport, was held up and \$1,100 taken, is serving 10 to 20 years in the Eastern Penitentiary for the crime.

John P. Walsh, Philadelphia attorney, said Shock had not worked for two years prior to the robbery, and his family had no food. He said a \$1,500 mortgage on his Montoursville home was to be foreclosed.
