Developed at the Pennsylvania State College agriculture experiment station by Dr. Ernest L. Nixon, plant pathologist, the Richard Peters pear continues to be resistant to fire blight.

Last year this pear was inoculated with 100 strains of the blight-producing organism. None gave it the disease. Fire blight was epidemic and many varieties died, but the Richard Peters showed no blight either at the College or in several other parts of the State.

This pear has been planted in four Pennsylvania counties and has been distributed to California, Georgia, North Carolina, Virginia, New York and Canada; the variety must be planted near another variety which will pollinate it. About 190 seedlings, mostly crosses of Boce on Richard Peters, are now coming into bearing age. Many of these appear to be as blight-resistant as Richard Peters and should be of a higher quality.

ODD STONE FOUND BY HUNTER NEAR KARTHHAUS

An odd stone, with a mysterious design imprinted on its face was found by William Blackburn, 70, a Johnstown hunter, in the region between Karthaus and Driftwood and has aroused considerable speculation and comment.

Mr. Blackburn has been advised by members of the staff of the Johnstown branch of the University of Pittsburgh to send photographs and a description of the stone to the Carnegie Museum at Pittsburgh.

The formation is believed unusual enough to give them reason for further study.

The Johnstown man, with a party of hunters, came upon the rock on a hillside above Wyckoff creek, slipping out of the ground several inches. The pattern was different from anything they had ever seen before and they stopped to examine it.

It was soft sandstone and its pattern oddly resembled that of a microscopic view of a woolen blanket. Depressions were as much as one-fourth of an inch and the markings covered an area of 5 by 12 inches.

They broke off a section of the rock and took it back to Johnstown. It was suggested that the markings might be those of a large animal or lizard, crushed between the rocks, but those who have seen the stone say it resembles no other fossil design ever found in this section.

PHILIPSBURG BOY JAILED ON CHARGES OF LARCENY
John Fleck, 16, of North Phillipsburg, is being held in the county jail here, in default of \$300 bail on charges of larceny of money from the Freeman insurance office and a pocketbook from the Burefield store, Phillipsburg.

He was committed to jail following a hearing held before Justice of the Peace J. Mac Pearce at Phillipsburg.

The investigation and arrest were made by Chief of Police N. E. Lamoreaux, who said that the youth previously served two years at the Clearfield reformatory school and was released on parole.
