DATE NAMED FOR GROUND BREAKING AT STATE COLLEGE

Harrisburg.—The \$5,000,000 state authority construction project at Pennsylvania State College will be inaugurated Feb. 26 with one of the "largest public celebrations" ever held at the school...

First shovelful of earth in the ground breaking ceremonies will be turned by Gov. George H. Earle, Janeway said, and dedicating addresses will be made by the governor and Dr. Ralph D. Hetzel, Penn State president.

Prof. Richard Grant, representing the college faculty and undergraduates, Edward Hishman, executive secretary of the Penn State Alumni Association, Col. Janeway and Edward W. Pendergast, secretary to the governor, made arrangements for the ceremonies at the Capitol today.

It was estimated 15,000 guests will attend the ceremonies, which will be broadcast in a state-wide radio hook-up.

FREIGHT WRECKED IN CLEARFIELD CO.

CURWENSVILLE.—A fast New York Central freight train was wrecked near here yesterday, piling up two engines and nineteen cars along a quarter-mile stretch.

No one was injured. The train made up of 70 cars, was passing through Clearfield county, enroute from Chicago to Philadelphia.

Trainmen said the lead engine was first to leave the rails, but they were unable to determine the cause. Known as CP-2, the train was derailed in the Newberry yards Monday afternoon with its cargo of perishable goods.

A Lake Shore crew each day takes the train as far as Clearfield, from where a Clearfield to Newberry crew brings it to the local yards for transfer to the Reading Railroad.

The wreckage was expected to be cleared away this morning.

STATE AIR INSPECTOR FOUND SHOT IN HEAD

HARRISBURG.— Investigation was opened today into the death of Lieut. Fred (Shorty) Nelson, state aeronautics division inspector, found shot through the head in a small building at the rear of his home in suburban Lemoyne.

Cumberland County Coroner E. A. Haegele started the investigation after Nelson's body was discovered last yesterday by his wife and Lemoyne Police Chief Stewart Christine. A shotgun lay near the flyer. The pair traced spots of blood to the building and forced open the locked door.

Nelson was said to have been ill, but not seriously. He recently returned home from a month's vacation.

The former army pilot taught many persons to fly, among them Wilmer Stultz, who flew the missing Amelia Earhart on her first flight across the Atlantic.

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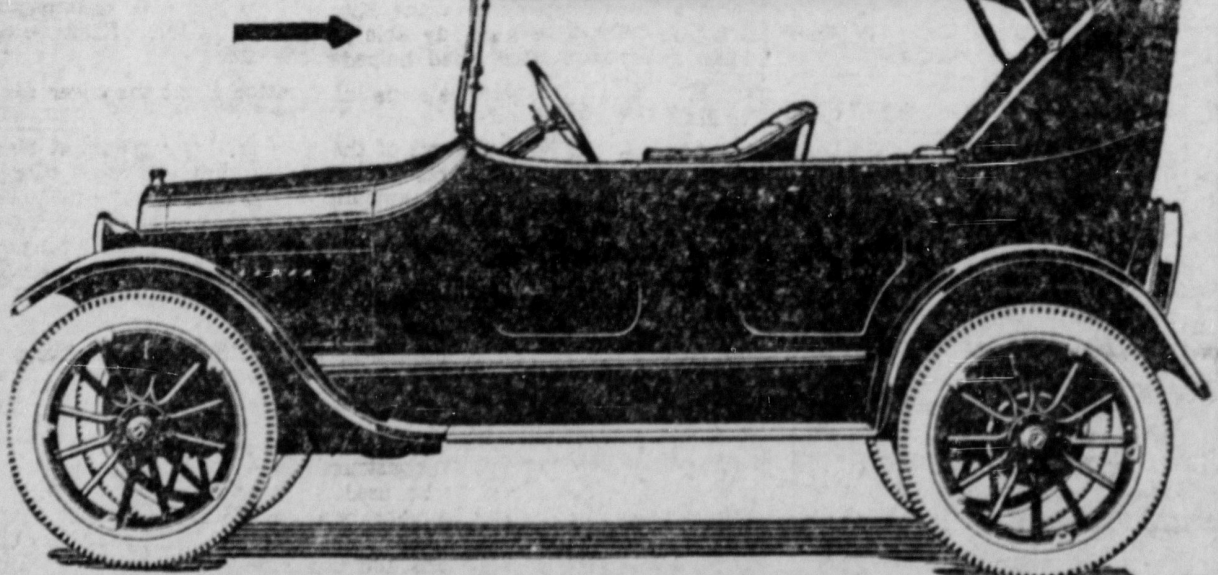
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
