REBERSBURG NATIVE IS SKILLED HUNTER, FARMER

Orvis Schroyer, of Ellburn, Ill., a native of Rebersburg, is winning considerable fame as a hunter in Centre county, and as a farmer in Illinois.

Mr. Schroyer takes care of his hunting laurels every fall by returning to Rebersburg to get his buck. That his skill is not diminishing was proved last week when he brought down a 9-point buck, and he sent us a photo of the splendid deer to prove it.

Mr. Schroyer went to Illinois as a boy of 12 years, and has lived in that State ever since. Proof that he is widely recognized as an able farmer is contained in a dispatch printed recently in an Illinois newspaper. The clipping follows:

"Orvis Schroyer of Lily Lake, operating a tractor and two shared plow, turned half an acre of Will county farm land into nearly perfect furrows yesterday, winning the championship of the sixtieth annual Wheatland plowing match. Schroyer, who also was the 1936 winner, defeated seven other contestants in the championship class.

"More than 10,000 persons watched the contest, called the world series of farmwork. It was held on the Martin Frey farm three miles north of Plainfield, in Will county. Contestants were scored on straightness, furrows, conformation, evenness of depth, and neatness. Judges gave Champion Schroyer a score of 91 out of a possible 100 points. No competitor ever has scored 100."

GOVERNOR TO OPEN COLLEGE BUILDING PROGRAM

The \$5,000,000 State Authority construction project at Pennsylvania State College will be inaugurated February 26 with one of the "largest public celebrations" ever held at the school, Col. A. S. Janeway, Authority director, announced this week.

First shovelful of earth in the ground breaking ceremonies will be turned by Gov. George H. Earle, Janeway said, and dedicating addresses will be made by the Governor and Dr. Ralph D. Hetzel, Penn State president.

Prof. Richard Grant, representing the College faculty and undergraduates, Edward Hishman, executive secretary of the Penn State Alumni Association, Col. Janeway and Edward W. Prendergast, secretary to the Governor, are making arrangements for the ceremonies.

It was estimated 15,000 guests will attend the ceremonies, which will be broadcast in a state-wide radio hook-up.

unit and the various equipment used.

The Kylertown unit, he said, is engaged in airways and general observation, work making hourly weather observations, the preparation of weather maps and a study of upper air conditions.

The office, located on Ames field, is equipped with many modern instruments, including a teletype with automatic sender.

The most interesting thing from the public's point of view, Mr. Bruce said, will be the "balloon run" at 10 a. m. and 4 p. m. "Four of these are made each day.

The procedure is to release an inflated balloon and follow its flight through an instrument known as the theodolite. By watching the release balloons they determine the direction and velocity of winds at different levels, observations which are of great value to airplane pilots, and the study of which aids in weather forecasting.

The longest "run" made in this section was at Bellefonte some time ago. Mr. Bruce stated, when observers followed a balloon for 185 minutes to a height of 51,200 feet. The longest "run" ever made he said, was in the tropics and lasted 189 minutes.

The Kylertown bureau now has five full-time commissioned men, and give 24-hour service.

The personnel includes Mr. Bruce of Braintree, Mass., who has had eight years of bureau service in Vermont, Massachusetts, Bellefonte and Kylertown; John Courtney, of Baltimore who has had seven years of service; Charles O. Tucker, of Hancock, Mich., who has served in the middle west, and in Puerto Rico since 1910, and Joseph Dederman and David Asher of Philadelphia.
