COLLEGE HEAD WRITES LETTER OF APPRECIATION John J. Bower, Fire Marshall of Bellefonte, this week received from Dr. Ralph D. Hetzel, President of the Pennsylvania State College, a letter expressing the institution's appreciation of the service rendered by the Bellefonte Fire Department Wednesday of last week when the Chemistry Annex burned to the ground.

Dr. Hetzel points out that while the services of the Bellefonte firemen were later found to be unnecessary, college officials at the time did request a very real alarm for the safety of nearby buildings, and stated that they were greatly relieved when the Bellefonte apparatus arrived on the scene.

In closing, Dr. Hetzel offers in behalf of the college to make any settlement which may be asked for the services of the fire company. Fire Marshall Bower, in explaining why no charge would be made for the Logan's trip to State College, said: "We have a tacit agreement with surrounding towns and cities which have their own fire departments, to aid them in cases of emergency. They do the same for us."
