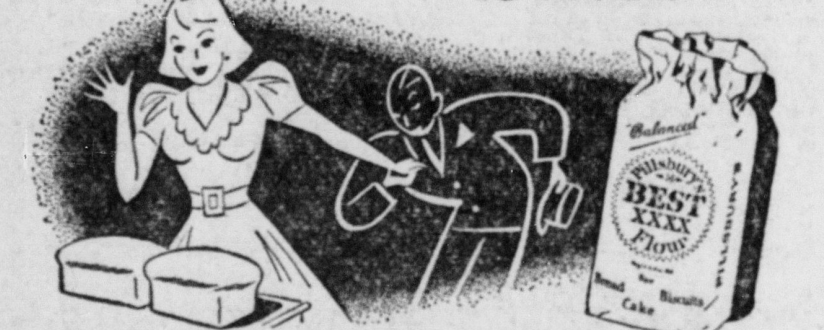

May 14, 1863 during the Battle of Chancellorsville, Mr. Bathurst was wounded in the right leg, but remained with his regiment. July 3, the same year, he was in the Battle of Gettysburg, and was confined to the Chestnut Hill Hospital, Philadelphia, until December 1863, when he rejoined his regiment.

Simon Bathurst's service did not go without recognition from his superiors. On April 17, 1863, he was made a Corporal, and on February 28, 1865 he became a Sergeant. After the War Mr. Bathurst became a charter member of the George L. Potter Post, No. 261, G. A. R., and was in command of the Post for years until it was disbanded. He was a member of the P. O. S. of A. of Bellefonte, and was a charter member of Camp No. 230, P. O. of A. of Millersburg.

Upon returning home from the War Mr. Bathurst learned the iron trade, and he rose to the position of foreman in the Curtin Iron Works, remaining there until his retirement from active life in April, 1907. He was a lifelong member of the Evangelical church at Curtin, and was a faithful attendant at services there until 1916, when he went to Millersburg to make his home with his daughter, Mrs. Yeager. Since that time he attends the Millersburg Baptist Church, although he was not a member of the congregation. Possessing an unusually clear mind and more than a trace of the physical strength characteristic of those who earned their livelihood in the iron industry, Mr. Bathurst remained an interesting companion until the end. He was fond of recounting tales of the war and of his experiences during his youth as a boatman. For exercise he favored wood and when weather was favorable, walked several blocks to the business section of Millersburg.

Mr. Bathurst's death leaves but eight Civil War veterans in Centre County. They are: Thomas Brew Hamilton, 100, of Bellefonte; P. O. M. Garver, 86, Cyrus Walker, 92, of State College; Capt. C. T. Fryberger, 94, David Williams, 90, and Miles Morrison, 90, all of Phillipsburg; George P. Thomas, 91, Howard, and John H. Hoffman, 91, Millersburg.
