CHARLES F. CORMAN

Charles F. Corman, 51, engineer for the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, died of a heart attack last Thursday evening at his home in Crescen. A native of Centre County, Mr. Corman was born June 10, 1886, a son of Harry Corman, deceased, and Mrs. Lydia (Rockey) Corman of Crescen. He had been in the employ of the railroad company for several years. In addition to his mother, Mr. Corman leaves his widow, Mrs. Anna Corman, and a sister, Mrs. Frank Schwaiber, Crescen. His church affiliations were with the Methodist Episcopal Church, Crescen. He was a member of Crescen Lodge No. 730, I. O. O. F., and the Pennsylvania Railroad Association. Funeral services were conducted Sunday with interment at Crescen.

Michael Smith, lifelong resident of Centre County, and for many years prominent citizen of Potters Mills, passed away at the home of his son, Roy Smith, at 2:15 o'clock last Thursday morning after a brief illness with a complication of diseases. About ten days prior to his death Mr. Smith suffered a stroke, remaining in a semi-conscious condition until the end. Mr. Smith had been blind for the past 24 years, but that handicap did not prevent him from chopping wood, shaving himself and performing many other duties usually believed to be beyond the province of persons deprived of sight. He deceased was a son of Henry and Mary Ann Smith and was born at Pine Grove Mills 84 years ago last October. Fifty-eight years ago he was united in marriage with Miss Lena Jordan, of Boalsburg, who passed away in November 1936. He was the last surviving member of a family of nine children. Surviving in addition to the son, Roy, is a daughter, Mrs. Ruth Thomas, also of

Potters Mills, and four grandchildren. Funeral services were held from the family residence Saturday afternoon, in charge of the Rev. Delas R. Keener, of Centre Hall. Interment was made in the Spruceview cemetery, near Potters Mills. He later went into business for himself, and for several years had been proprietor of a furniture store and was owner of this establishment at the time of his death. Members of the family include his wife, one son, J. Carroll Glenn, of Pittsburgh; one daughter, Mrs. Mary Louise Miller, of Altoona; three brothers, William V. Glenn, of Harrisburg; Carroll, of Altoona who is seriously ill in a Cleveland hospital, and John, of Altoona. Mr. Glenn received his education at Snow Shoe going to Altoona at the age of 17 and residing there since. He was a member of the First Presbyterian church, of Mountain lodge, No. 280, F. & A. M. of Williamsport consistory and of Jaffa Shrine. He also was a member of the Altoona lodge No. 102, B. P. O. E.
