The deceased, a widely known citizen of Penn's Valley, was a son of Charles W. and Salsinda Hosterman, and was born at Woodward 62 years ago. About 30 years ago he was united in marriage with Margaret Schreckengast, of Tykerville, who survives with a daughter, Mrs. Ray Harlock, of Buffalo, N. Y. These brothers and sisters also survive: J. STATE COLLEGE JEWELRY STORE ROBBED 2ND TIME

For the second time in less than three years, thieves threw a stone through one of the windows of the H. S. Shomberg jewelry store on East College avenue, State College, at 3 o'clock Monday morning and escaped with articles valued at approximately \$480.

It is thought the robbery took place shortly before it was discovered when several Colgate students passed the building. The stone used by the robbers to break the window was found on the display ledge.

Included in the loot were 10 rings, four watches, bracelets, compact and a small purse-watch.

Only gold gold rings were taken from the window and those of less value were not touched. It was reported.

ing the lake. On Christmas morning he again smashed the water line, the assistant superintendent continued, stating:

"I was called to the institution and found that La Maur had broken a water pipe for the second time that morning. He had barricaded his cell door with a cot and was daring officers to come into his cell, threatening to kill the first person who opened the door. He had some kind of a weapon in his hand. I ordered him to pass out the weapon which he refused to do, again threatening to kill the first person who came into his cell. Seeing the persuasion and orders were to no avail, I ordered the cot to be removed. The prisoner was removed to another cell where his violence continued and it was necessary to give him a dose of strychnine."

The assistant superintendent denied that La Maur was given an examination by Dr. A. B. Waite, resident physician, the following day and that he "did not show any alarming conditions."

On the morning of December 27, La Maur died suddenly and Dr. Steele was called in when Dr. Waite couldn't be located. Dr. Steele said "there was nothing whatsoever to indicate there was any mistreatment" after an examination of the prisoner's body. He diagnosed the death as caused by a "heart attack induced by his exposure to the water in his cell when he broke the pipes, which aggravated a rheumatic condition."

Superintendent John D. Pennington said it was "his conviction that the responsible officer handling this inmate's case acted with both discretion and judgment."

La Maur, who also was known as "Red," was admitted to the reformatory on November 18, 1937, after he pleaded guilty to a larceny charge in Philadelphia. His term was to have expired November 18, 1940.

FATHER MCGUIRE TAKES UP DUTIES IN PARISH

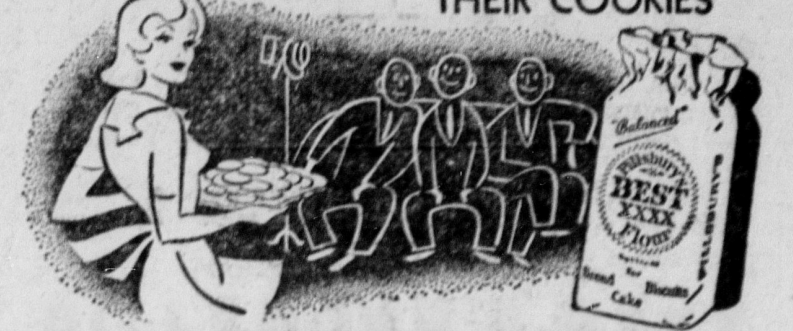
Father Bernard McGuire, who came to Bellefonte last week as assistant to the Rev. Father William E. Downes, rector of St. John's Catholic church, is no stranger to scores of Centre Countians, since 2 years of the 3 1/2 he spent in the service of the United States Government as chaplain in C. C. Camps were spent in Centre County camps.

Father McGuire, whose home is in Philadelphia, studied for the priesthood at St. Charles Seminary, Overbrook. He was ordained from St. Francis College, Loretto, in 1930, and was assigned to the Altoona Diocese of the church. Mrs. Mary Semink, 25, convicted of second degree murder of her husband, has been paroled from the Industrial Home for Women at Muncy in care of a brother at Sugar Grove, Pa.

Miss Florence M. Wilson, supervisor of the Industrial Home, said Mrs. Semink was released Dec. 23 after serving her minimum sentence of a year and a half.

Her husband, Metro Semink, was shot March 25, 1936, at his tavern near Warren.

Miss Wilson said Mrs. Semink has been an "ideal prisoner."

POSSESSION OF VENISON ILLEGAL AFTER JAN. 11

Hunters are reminded by Seth Gordon, Executive Director of the Game Commission, that January 11 was the time limit under which they may possess legally killed venison without a permit.

Any person desiring to possess deer meat after January 11, the Director stated, should have filed an application with the department, which has, under the new law, power to grant a permit without cost to retain lawfully taken venison for an additional six months.

SEK 57,000 IN 1938 WELFARE DRIVE AT COLLEGE

At a meeting of State College Welfare Fund officials last week, the 1938 budget was set at \$76,000, with nine agencies participating in the fund. The campaign is to get under way January 17.

The agencies and the amounts to be allocated to each during the year if the drive is successful, are as follows: ambulance project, \$10,000; Associated Charities, \$1,500; Boy Scouts, \$600; Centre County Hospital, \$1,200; crippled children, \$600; Girl Scouts, \$600; Juvenile Council, \$150; Nursery School, \$300; and Salvation Army, \$750.

Russell was dismissed summarily for "disloyalty and insubordination."

Hastely the governor called for the list of Republicans on the state payroll after he was informed by an adviser:

"They aren't the only ones. There are lots more around here."

"Who are they?" Earle was reported to have demanded and then directed the request be passed on to the county leaders.

The orders met with instantaneous action on the part of most county leaders, who have grown more and more outspoken in their complaints against patronage dispensation at the capitol.

In the past two years the governor has aroused the opposition of Democratic chiefs, so seriously in some cases that open threats of bolting the organization should Earle be a primary candidate for re-actor have been made.

Leaders charge they cannot control their local organizations in close election because of opposition by state jobholders who have been retained from the Pinchot administration or received their appointments through "personal influence" with the governor.

Objects of the heaviest fire have been the Departments of Highways and Public Assistance.

While the vast majority of jobs in the highways department have been filled from Democratic patronage lists, many of the best-paying technical posts still are held by holdover Republicans. The argument advanced by Highways Secretary Warren Van Dyke and Earle is that the technical engineering posts are difficult to fill has not eased the resentment.
