THIRTY-FIVE MAKE DEPOSITS IN POSTAL SAVINGS ACCOUNT

Thirty-five Bellefonte residents had made deposits totaling \$16,694 in the Federal postal savings accounts as of June 30, last, the post-office department reported to Congress this week.

This compared with the 86 Bellefonte depositors recorded as participating in the Federal banking agency at the close of the preceding fiscal year, June 30, 1936, who had on deposit sums totaling \$16,575.

According to the official report, in Pennsylvania's 413 offices a total of 141,478 persons had \$62,847,576 on deposit at the close of the fiscal year.

The number of depositors for the entire country increased during the fiscal year, the postmaster general reported, the gain being 86,219 or 3.2 per cent and the total number of the nation's thrifty putting money into care of the postoffice department now amounts to 2,791,371. At the same time the average principal amount per depositor decreased from \$455.31 to \$454.14, it was reported, a loss of \$1.17 per capita.

The postal savings system, always a self-supporting, sported a net profit for the fiscal year of 1937 of \$5,170,965.52.
