

ducted. I would like to correct the statement as I am wedded. "On the morning of Jan. 4 I started from home for school and met my boy friend, George Hoover, and went east and was married to him. I was not forced to go with him, I went on my own good wil, we had all ar-

ngements made before hand. "As for the statement saying that was afraid of George, I was not but I had to pretend I was because I was forbidden to go with him.

"George did not try to run me down with a car and as for doing harm to the family I have never heard of him doing so.

The note sent home to mother stating I was getting married was written by me of my own free will. "We are getting along fine and are at the present residing in Youngstown. Ohio."

"Mrs. Marian (Fleck) Hoover." Disclosing that she had received no word except the brief note telling the wedding, the girl's mothe said that she was still convinced that there was more to the case than present surface indications denote.
