CONSERVING THE SABBATH FOR MAN. International Sunday School Lesson for February 12, 1933.

GOLDEN TEXT: "And he said unto them, the Sabbath was made for man."—Mark 2:27.

Lesson Text: Mark 2:23-3:6.

The Scribes and the Pharisees apparently followed Jesus everywhere he went, curiosity and the desire to criticize being the motives uppermost in their minds.

Waking along a footpath by a grainfield, the disciples, hungry from their accustomed Sabbath fast, plucked the heads of grain (corn) and ate them.

By so doing, Jesus did not abolish the Fourth Commandment. He agreed with the Pharisees that it was a day, holy unto God.

Jesus recognized the fact that man and his rights were superior to an institution. Sunday is meant to serve our human needs, but we must remember that man has a great variety of needs.

What, questions Dr. Erdman, in his Commentary, "Is man? Is he only an animal? If so, a day made for him may well be spent wholly in physical exercise, recreation and indulgence.

Does he have a soul? Is that his essential faculty? Then his Sabbath should be devoted to mental culture and aesthetic pursuits.

Is man an immortal soul, created with the power to fellowship with God? Then a Sabbath is properly spent in seeking refreshments for body and mind.

While operating a snow plow County Commissioner Daniel A. Grove was injured when his seat was thrown across the side planks of the machine, sustaining several cracked ribs and painful bruises.

A number of school house coal bins in Potter township were being scrapped for fuel, and it was predicted that the school house and chopping block might again make their appearance where there were no teachers.

John G. King, Centre Hall's oldest resident, was dangerously ill at his home in that community. In addition to a chronic stomach ailment, Mr. King had fallen and fractured a rib, adding to his misery.

John M. Keichline received his commission as Justice of the Peace from Governor Burroughs, to succeed O. W. Reese, through whom he resigned from the office. Mr. Keichline was to open offices in Temple Court.

Miss Eloise Buck, daughter of Daniel Buck, of Unionville, entered the offices of the Bellefonte Lumber Company as bookkeeper and stenographer. She succeeded Enoch Bower, who held that position for a number of years.

Up to the present time no German lens had presented themselves for registration in Bellefonte. Under the law, postmasters in towns of 5,000 or less had to perform the duty of registering unmarried adult Germans of 14 years or older, consequently Postmaster Gherry felt he had to do this in Bellefonte. It was believed that there were few German Aliens in this area.

The law firm of S. D. Gettig and J. J. Bower moved their offices from the Eagle block to the rooms formerly occupied by the old law firm of Fortney & Fortney, on the north side of East High Street. Mr. Gettig, the senior partner in the firm, had occupied the offices in the Eagle Block for 20 years, having gone there as an assistant to the old firm of Orvis Bower & Orvis.

An exploding lantern in the barn of the Oster Livestock Company, about 1 1/2 miles west of Waddle, resulted in a fire which destroyed the barn and most of its contents, including 8 horses, 3 cows, a heifer and about 100 chickens. The farm was owned by a company of which George Gates was head. Other members included his brother, Stewart Gates, his wife, Mrs. Carson and Stewart Gates were in the barn at the time, and had gone to another part of the building, leaving the lantern hanging on a hook.

During their absence the lantern exploded. Total damage was estimated at about \$14,000, about half of which was covered by insurance.
